tion was it announced that the prime minister who is 70, was ill. The prime minister was said to have been suffering from gout for several days.

Allies Stronger

Chamberlain, in the speech read by Sir John, contended the position of the allies since the outbreak of the war had strengthened rather than deteriorated.

He listed the British-French-Turkish mutual assistance treaty as "a powerful instrument for the peace of southeastern Europe."

He set against it the Russian-German agreement which he asserted "had gained indeed great advantages for the Soviet Union, but has brought only humiliation and loss for Germany."

TOKYO NEWS WRITER SEES CONFLICT FOR SOUTH SEA POWERS

Tokyo, Nov. 9.—(AP)—The political commentator of the newspaper Kokumin predicted today that "a conflict to acquire territories and resources in the South seas will be fought in the Pacific during or after the European war."

The result, he wrote, probably will be the "expulsion" of the United States from east Asia.

Asserting that South sea islands, including the Philippines, were "certain to become an arena of struggle among various powers," the article said:

"Japan's first task, therefore, is to organize China as an independent state. Then, if the United States persists in remaining hostile to Japan, we shall be ready for the greatest crisis—the result of which probably will be that the United States is expelled from east Asia entirely."

McLAGLEN BUYS 760-ACRE RANCH

Fresno, Calif., Nov. 9.—(AP)—Film Actor Victor McLaglen is the new owner of the Balfe ranch, a 760-acre central California showplace of thousands of fruit trees and vines, a dozen buildings, a private airport and extensive stables including 30 thoroughbred horses.

Harry Balfe, retired New York financier, announced sale of the estate yesterday. He said the price exceeded \$250,000.

The ranch, located four and one-half miles northeast of Clovis in the Sierra Nevada foothills, was developed at a cost of more than \$1,000,000 since Balfe purchased the land in 1919, he said.

McLaglen said he had no plans for improvements on the ranch. He said he intended to reside there part of his time but would continue his work in pictures. Mrs. McLaglen was one of the prize winners at the recent Fresno district fair horse show.

MYSTERY GROWS IN GANG SLAYING

Chicago, Nov. 9.—(AP)—An anonymous threat to bomb the home of Edward J. O'Hare added a new element of mystery to the slaying of the nationally known turfman.

The threat to "blow up" the suburban Glenview residence of the wealthy horse and dog track operator was telephoned to a negro maid whom the caller advised to leave immediately.

O'Hare, 43 and president of the Sportsman's park race track, was slain in gangster fashion late yesterday afternoon after a wild automobile chase along Ogden avenue.

The victim raced his expensive automobile northeast toward the loop apparently knowing he was marked for death. His car smashed into a pole when he turned into a side street. The assassins then slowed almost to a stop and fired two shotgun charges.

An unfired .32 caliber pistol lay on the seat of O'Hare's car.
