CALIFORNIANS SEE DRIVES FOR MORE LIBERAL PENSIONS

More Money for Elders Will Be Sought On Three Fronts, Leaders Predict

San Francisco, Nov. 9.—(AP)—Renewed drives for more liberal old age pensions were forecast today by political observers as a probable result of California's smashing rejection of the "ham and eggs" pension plan at Tuesday's special election.

More money for the elder citizens will be sought on three fronts, the state's political leaders indicated—in congress, from the state legislature, and again from the voters in a third attempt of the "ham and eggs" advocates.

Solution Needed
The necessity of finding a solution that will satisfy both the taxpayers and the impoverished elderly people who contributed their pennies to finance the last campaign, was stressed by State Senator Robert W. Kenny, director of the opposition.

"The fact that a million of our

citizens felt they had so little to lose that they were willing to try anything should make everyone realize that there is a serious disease in our body politic," Senator Kenny said.

Both Senator Kenny and Gov. Culbert L. Olson insisted final solution could be reached only on a national scale. This is identical with the belief expressed by Senator Sheridan Downey who was elected a year ago on "ham and egg" votes.

May Unite in Demand
Some observers suggested the "ham and eggs" vote might lead the California congressional delegation to unite in a demand for federal pensions, as they recently joined in requesting a national action toward solution of the migrant problem, another of the state's perennial worries. Californians have already taken the Townsend old age pension plan to congress and mustered some backing from other sections of the country.

But creators of the "ham and eggs" proposal were unwilling to wait for any national action which would not equal their contemplated \$30 in warrants every week. Roy G. Owens announced they would soon start circulating petitions for a new initiative and for recall of Governor Olson because he opposed the plan.

BOY SCOUT RALLY FOR ENTIRE AREA TOMORROW NIGHT

Fourth Annual Conclave to Bring Boys From North California, South Oregon

Medford will again serve as host for the fourth annual council Boy Scout rally Friday evening. The program will be held on the gymnasium floor of Medford senior high school. The junior high school drum and bugle corps will open the rally with interesting maneuvers. This will be followed by a parade of colors along the various troop and patrol flags representing scout and cubbing units from all parts of the Crater Lake area council territory.

According to R. E. McElhose, Boy Scout commissioner, there will be scouting troops from Cave Junction, Kerby, Merlin, Jerome Prairie and Grants Pass of Josephine county; McCloud, Dunsmuir, Mt. Shasta, Tennant and Weed from southern Siskiyou county district; Montague, Yreka, Etna, Hilt, Copco and Hornbrook of northern Siskiyou county district; Ashland and Talent from Ashland district; Upper Rogue, Prospect, Central Point, Jacksonville and troops representing Medford district. These five districts have each held their annual district scout rallies and winners from these rallies will compete for council honors tomorrow night.

Troop 3 Local Winner.
The local troop with the highest number of points at the Medford district rally, October 6, was troop 3, which meets at Roosevelt school on Thursday evening, sponsored by the Medford Lions club, with Jack Thompson, scoutmaster. The local American Legion troop 7, under Scoutmaster Ralph Hulbert, won first place in the knotting relay race and in fire-by-friction. In the latter, troop 7's record was 29.5 seconds.

Troop 40, Central Point, under Scoutmaster J. E. Vincent, took first place and will represent the district in making fire by flint and steel. Troop 40's time was 7.7 seconds. In the spectacular chariot race the local district will be represented by troops 3 and 40, who covered the indoor chariot race-track in exactly 18.9 seconds each. All troops of the council area are invited to participate in the first five events of the evening's program, punctuality, attendance, visitors, a additional members and opening parade of colors. One hundred points will be awarded each troop with a perfect score in these five events with exception of attendance of visitors, for which the troop will receive 1000 points for first place.

All to Sing.
The audience will be invited to join with the scouts in singing "God Bless America," with accordion accompaniment by Homer McDonald. During the evening there will be a demonstration of various scouting activities in the form of a three-ring circus type of display. If troops enter all events for which they are scheduled, an extra 1000 points will be given for "participation."

Opening "kick-off" will be sounded by Frank Hull, Boy Scout commissioner for the Medford district. The council perpetual rally trophy will be presented at the close of the evening by Don Newbury, Crater Lake area council advancement chairman. Scouts Alfred Dodson and Elmer Bashaw will serve as bugler and trumpeter for the evening.

LITRELL DAMAGE CASE UNDER WAY

The damage suit of Robert Littrell, a minor, through his father, against Lee Smith, as operator of the Yellow Taxis started in circuit court before Judge H. D. Norton today with selection of a jury. A venire of five new names was ordered drawn, in case more jurors were needed.

The plaintiff seeks \$3000 damages as a result of a bicycle-taxicab crash last July in traffic at Main and Central streets, in which young Littrell while riding a wheel was allegedly struck by a taxi driven by an employee of the defendant.

The defense is represented by Attorney George M. Roberts and William McAllister and the plaintiff by Attorney Charles W. Reames. The case is expected to be concluded late tomorrow.

ROGUE SNOWMEN PLAN TO OPEN UP M'DONALD BASIN

A meeting of the board of directors of the Rogue Snowmen was held Wednesday night at Larsen's clothes shop, with the following present: Kenneth G. Denman, president; Harold Wall, vice-president; Harold Larsen and John Neidermeyer, directors.

It was pointed out by the president that definite progress had been made towards opening up McDonald Basin ski area and that a ski shelter had been built in the basin during the past summer by the forest service, which would be available for skiing parties this coming winter. It was also pointed out that the ski pictures taken of the McDonald Basin had been shown in many places throughout the valley and that a definite interest had been created in the area.

It was decided the ski club should take steps to obtain a ski lift for the use of members during the winter. This would be in the nature of a portable ski lift that could be moved about and used in various places. Harold Wall was appointed to investigate the matter and report at the next board meeting.

This lift would be available only to club members. In the near future a membership drive will be inaugurated with the idea of securing a large membership in the club. It was pointed out that the development of McDonald Basin could be brought about only by an organized group which would work continually to that end. Therefore, a large membership would aid materially in bringing about this accomplishment.

HIT RUNNER PAYS \$25 FINE, COSTS
