Central Point Fails to Land In Class A Loop

The district 9 basketball conference, composed of Medford, Ashland and Grants Pass high schools, will go to the post the coming season with the same personnel as always.

For a time it looked like Central Point would crack into the loop because of increased school enrollment making the Pointers a class B institution, instead of class A, but Superintendent H. P. Jewett informs us that the deadline was passed with the school still lacking four students of the required 150 for class A ranking.

Thus, Central Point will continue, for one more basketball year at least, to compete with the other class B schools of the county, while Medford, Ashland and Grants Pass will retain their present setup and battle it out for a state tournament berth.

As long as we have broken out with the above out-of-season sports scribbling, might as well add a little baseball talk to it. We received a letter the other day from Charles E. Chapman, Pacific coast representative for the Cincinnati Reds and their farm system, with some interesting figures concerning the results of their last fall's tryout camps for young players, one of which was held here.

Chapman wrote that 19 camps were held, with a total enrollment of 1215. Cincinnati signed 25 young players, besides offering contracts to five others who haven't accepted as yet, and 14 players were invited to try out at the spring training camp of the Ogdens, Utah, team in the Pioneer league, at their own expense, to see if they can win a contract.

"One of our Medford camp graduates of the past was taken up to the big leagues this year," Chapman wrote. "He was Paul Gehrmann, right-hand pitcher of Bend, who was selected at the Medford camp in 1936. Washington drafted him from us—our Birmingham club—for \$6,000. That price will pay for many Medford camp, but I regret that we had to take it. Gehrmann may make his mark in the majors next year."

Local-boy-makes-good note: In a press release from the University of Oregon, the following was written about Bob Smith: "Sensation of Oregon's offense in the past two games, against U.C.L.A. and Washington State, has been Lefty Bob Smith, heretofore chiefly noted as an accurate southpaw passer. Smith not only has continued his great

passing but has averaged 6.2 yards a play on the ground, breaking away six times for long runs. Smith's great performances make him a likely starter at right half against Oregon State."

And while on the subject, a vote of congratulation to Bob Hinman, end for Willamette university, who was picked on the all-star first team for the smaller northwest colleges. This all-star selection includes all the Northwest conference eleven, and is a fine honor for the former Tiger star.

Any way you look at it, Medford's Black Tornado is an overwhelming favorite to defeat the Ashland high Grizzlies here next Saturday afternoon in their traditional Armistice Day grid clash, but this football is a funny business. The game may turn out to be a whole of a clash, regardless of the records and comparative scores, etc.

Look what Illinois did to Michigan last week. Illinois hadn't won a game all year and Michigan was undefeated and untied, and rated at least five touchdowns stronger than their opponents. The score was Illinois 16, Michigan 7, and it was no fluke victory. The Illinois outplayed Michigan and deserved to win.

We are not saying Ashland will beat Medford, nor will come close to it, for we don't think the Grizzlies have the man-power to successfully combat the Tornado. But, stranger things have happened, and this is just a reminder. Although Ashland hasn't won a game and Medford hasn't lost one, don't consider the game in the bag until the final whistle.

POINTERS PLAY HENLEY SATURDAY

Central Point high's 11-man football team, which held Southern Oregon conference Grants Pass Cavemen to a 13 to 7 victory last week, will end its 1939 schedule next Saturday afternoon, Armistice Day, with a game against Henley, strong Klamath county team, at Central Point. The game will start at 1:30.

In four games this season the Pointers have lost only to Grants Pass. They defeated Henley in a previous game, 13 to 6, and beat the Ashland high reserves. A tie was played in a second tilt with the latter aggregation.

PICHE, THURMAN OUT OF ASHLAND GAME WITH FLU

Ray Johnson to Start at Right Half; Wallis at Center; Ends Have Bad Colds

Principal Leonard Mayfield of Medford high announced today that Coquille high's Red Devils, through Coach Spike Leslie, had accepted Medford's financial offer for a Thanksgiving day football game here and that the clash was definitely assured. Acceptance of the Tiger offer was made in a telegram received this morning, Mayfield said.

Coquille, undefeated, untied and unscored-upon in six Coos county league games, plays its final game next Friday afternoon against Myrtle Point. In their six games the Red Devils have accumulated 221 points to their opponents zero, an average of almost 37 points per game.

Coach Bill Bowerman announced that Billy Piche, regular right halfback, and Harry Thurman, first string center, were definitely out of the Medford-Ashland grid clash here next Saturday afternoon, Armistice day.

"Piche and Thurman both have been in bed all week with the flu," Bowerman explained, "and positively will not be able to play against Ashland."

Three ends—Bob Leonard, Fred Gunnette and Don Moyer—have also been abed with the flu, but may see action against the Grizzlies, the coach said.

Bowerman plans to start Ray Johnson, the junior speedster, in Piche's right halfback position, and Jim Willis at center in place of Thurman. Stan Winter will be at one end position and the mentor is as yet undecided who will open at the other flank.

Remainder of the club is in good condition. Hibbert and Howard will be at the guards, Clute and Barrow at tackles, Louie Thurman at quarter. Bob Newland at left half and Saulsberry at full. Ike Orr may alternate with Johnson at right half.

The game, which will wind up Medford's Southern Oregon conference season, will start at 2 o'clock sharp, and will be the first daytime tilt the Tigers have played this year. A win for Medford will deadlock the loop title between Klamath Falls and the Tornado.

Bowerman announced that Jean Eberhart, Southern Oregon College of Education athlete director, would referee the clash. Joe Gray of Grants Pass and Parker Hess of Ashland will take care of the umpiring and head-linesman duties.

Arrangements have been completed to furnish fans at the game scores of the Oregon game in Eugene.

WINTER SHOOTING STARTS AT LOCAL GUN CLUB SUNDAY

The winter trapshooting season will open at the Medford Gun club grounds Sunday morning at 11 o'clock with a practice shoot to which the club has extended an invitation to the public to attend and shoot with the club members.

The club will shoot for the first time on the new Leggett trap recently installed, which is a duplicate of the new traps used at Vandalia, Ohio, at the Grand American Handicap shoot this summer. It is said to throw the best double targets of any trap that is made.

On Sunday, November 19, the club plans to hold its first turkey shoot and the members are being urged to reserve the day for the annual event to assure its success. With the upland bird season closed and most of the hunters finished with their treks to the Klamath marshes for ducks the club management expects a large crowd at the gun club where the shooter can shoot as much as he likes at clay birds.

Kenny Washington Nation's Second Best Ground-Gainer

Seattle, Nov. 9.—(AP)—The American football statistical bureau, which weekly compiles individual and team performances of the nation's 112 leading colleges, this week nominates Johnny Knolla of Creighton as the nation's leading ground-gainer.

After the bureau poured a load of figures into the maw of a complicated computing machine, Knolla emerged as the nation's number one offensive threat on the basis of the following statistics:

In six games he gained 887 yards via 75 rushing efforts and 52 pass attempts. Kenny Washington, the U.C.L.A. Negro flash, ranks second with 843 yards in six games. Last week's leader, Jim "Sweet" LaLanne of North Carolina, is third with 800 yards.

Washington has gained more yards net by rushing than any other—560 in 93 tries. Jack Crain of Texas has the highest average per effort—9.14 yards

—but Ken Washington's running mate at U.C.L.A., Jackie Robinson, has the best average among all ball carriers who have gained more than 250 yards. Robinson has netted almost 12 yards for each of the 21 times he has carried the pigskin.

Ernie Lain of Rice leads in forward pass completions, hitting his receivers 50 times in 122 attempts for 580 yards.

Earl Clark, Texas Christian halfback, and Ken Kavanaugh, Louisiana State end, pace the pass snatchers with 17 catches apiece.

For the third consecutive week Harry Dunline, North Carolina, ranks as the country's best punter, with an exceptional 46-yard average for 26 kicks.
