Camp Bullis, Texas—(AP)—If an army fights on its stomach, American doughboys will be prepared to put up a "tough scrap in any man's war," says Venzel Schneider, mess sergeant of a new streamlined infantry unit. Schneider says there is about as much similarity between the present streamlined cooking equipment of the army and the equipment used in the World War as there is between an old-time wood burning stove and a modern gas range.
