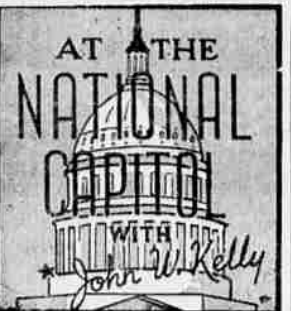

ASK \$271,000,000 TO EXPAND ARMS

Washington, Nov. 14.—(AP)—A request for \$271,000,000 to finance expansion of the army, navy, marine corps, coast guard and federal bureau of investigation, in accordance with President Roosevelt's declaration of a state of limited national emergency, has been transmitted by the chief executive to Chairman Taylor (D-Colo.) of the house appropriations committee.

M'ADOO ADDS VOICE TO CHORUS FAVORING THIRD TERM FOR F. R.

Washington, Nov. 14.—(AP)—Former Senator McAdoo of California was added today to the group publicly advocating a third term for President Roosevelt.
In a statement issued last night in San Francisco, McAdoo said recent discussions with "a number of outstanding Democrats" in Washington had shown "a general consensus" the president would be renominated.

FRANK PRESTON BARN ON BIG APPLAGATE IS DESTROYED BY BLAZE

Big Applegate, Nov. 14.—(AP)—Fire early this morning destroyed a large barn and shed and contents on the Frank Preston farm on the Big Applegate river two miles above Ruch.
Destroyed in the intense flames were 15 tons of baled hay, 100 tons of loose hay, a Ford car, a drill, several harrows, a tractor and other machinery. Forty head of sheep and other livestock were driven safely out of the flaming structure.

PANTAGES' SON CLAIMS WIFE SURPRISED WITH PALM SPRINGS BARMAN

Los Angeles, Nov. 14.—(AP)—Rodney Pantages of the theater family, seeking a divorce from pretty Beatrice Vegil Pantages and custody of their two children, introduced testimony she had associated with a Palm Springs bartender.
The case was barely under way yesterday, before a courtroom jammed with spectators anticipating spicy developments, when Pantages' counsel called George Kliman, a private detective.

MARINE COMMISSION BALKS TRANSFER OF SHIPS TO NEW FLAG

Washington, Nov. 14.—(AP)—The maritime commission refused today to permit the transfer to Panamanian registry of four steam screw vessels owned by the Pacific Steamship corporation.
The firm, incorporated in Nevada, is in process of liquidation under the bankruptcy act, the commission said, and the transfer would be "detrimental to the best interests of the United States."

San Francisco, Nov. 14.—(AP)—Harmon Waley, convicted kidnaper of George Weyerhaeuser in Tacoma, filed his fourth petition for release from Alcatraz prison in federal court today.

CHRISTMAS OPENING OF MEDFORD STORES SCHEDULED NOV. 24

First Lady has Ready Reply For Town Hall Questioners

Newark, N. J., Nov. 14.—(AP)—They fired a steady stream of questions, left and right, at Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt last night and the first lady met them all with replies as ready as her smile.
Nearing conclusion of her lecture tour, Mrs. Roosevelt finished her prepared talk to an audience of 3,500 at the Essex county town hall forum and then the chairman asked if there were any questions.
There were:
"Do you believe a change of administration at this time would affect the possibility of retaining peace in America?"
This was the closest any one came to the third term issue.
"No, I don't," Mrs. Roosevelt answered. "I believe any administration would do its best to keep this country at peace."
When should the United States act as intermediary for peace? was another query.
