Back from South—John E. Doerr, Jr., naturalist at Crater Lake national park, returned last night from the Lava Beds national monument in northern California where he spent a week in tracing the history of old Indian campsites. The monument is administered by the superintendent of Crater Lake national park.

Brings Prisoners—Three prisoners, all charged with selling liquor to Indians, were brought from Klamath Falls to the Jackson county jail here this morning by Paul Hanlin, U. S. deputy marshal. The prisoners were listed as Edward Gartland, 32, of Malin and William G. Anderson, 74, and Thomas Johnson, 61, of Klamath Falls. The aged Anderson was quoted as saying he had no place to live and he would just as soon go to a federal road camp or prison.

Park Weather Clear—Only a few patches of snow remained at road level in Crater Lake national park today, rangers reported by short-wave radio. The west, south and east entrance roads through the park were in good condition, the rangers said. Weather today was described as clear with visibility good. Maximum temperature in the past 24 hours was given as 45 degrees, minimum 25. A heavy frost occurred last night at Oregon Caves national monument, it was reported by short-wave radio from the caverns office. No snow has fallen at the caves this season yet and all facilities are functioning normally. Weather at the caves was clear today.
