

SCHOOL QUESTION TO BE DISCUSSED AT ROGUE RIVER

Public Meeting Tonight is Stated by School District Reorganization Board

A public meeting will be held at 8 o'clock this evening at the new high school building at Rogue River to which all registered voters and school patrons are invited. The newly-created school district reorganization board for Jackson county will be present to explain its function and to place before the people its findings and recommendations based upon a study of Jackson county.

The board was created by an act of the last legislature, and its purpose is to recommend ways in which the number of school districts may be reduced. Each county in Oregon is now being served by a similar board, except the four counties which are now operating under the county school law.

Problems Studied

The board has been studying the problems of taxation, transportation, ability to support schools, population and economy and efficiency of school operation since its organization in June, and as a result of these studies a considerable mass of statistical information is available to present and talk over with the people of the county.

The Rogue River public meeting is the first of a series to be held in various sections of the county; the second will be held at Central Point high school Tuesday, November 21. The meetings are open to everyone of voting age. Ample opportunity will be given to question the board whose desire is to get accurate information concerning its work before the people. The ultimate results will be determined in any event by the people themselves, who, under the law, may reject by their vote any recommendation that the board may make. The work of the board must be finished by September 1, 1940.

Representative Board

Personnel of the board is as follows: Earl B. Day, county judge; J. B. Coleman, county assessor; C. R. Bowman, county school superintendent; A. E. Brockway, president of the non-high school board; Stewart Weeks, member of Elk Creek school board; Arnold Bohner, member of Central Point school board; J. R. McCracken, member of Valley View school board.

It is planned to have as many members of the board as possible present at all the meetings held, and the several members will present various phases of the work of the board.

FIVE-DAY WEEK FOR UNION PRINTERS TO START JAN. 1, 1942

Indianapolis, Nov. 16.—(AP)—Members of the International Typographical union voted today to set up a five-day week in the printing industry by Jan. 1, 1942, Woodrat Randolph, secretary-treasurer of the union, announced today.

The present six-day week of six hours and 45 minutes a day would be supplanted by five-day week contracts with the various publishers by 1942 according to the authority vested in union officials by a referendum conducted among the members by mail ballot. The vote was 32,294 to 15,664.

The union members adopted two other amendments to the organization's by-laws and turned down two proposals.

By an overwhelming vote of 44,648 to 5,794, the union exempted members in active military and naval service from all local and international dues and assessments and authorized 25,294 to 24,094, officers and members employed by the union to use airplane transportation in emergencies.

The union voted down, 27,441 to 23,434, a proposal to reduce temporarily the pension and mortality assessment from two percent to one and one-half percent, followed by an increase to two percent as soon as the pension fund balance dropped to \$1,300,000.

RELEASED CAPONE EMMA HATLEY, 58, DISAPPEARS WITH FEDERAL OFFICERS

Emma Hatley, 58, a resident of Sumpter, Ore., for many years, passed away in Central Point, Ore., Wednesday at 7 p. m. after a prolonged illness.

Mrs. Hatley was born in Menasha, Minn., September 6, 1881. She came west with her parents when a young girl, and was united in marriage to Ralph C. Hatley in Sumpter, Ore., in April, 1903. They have lived there continuously since that time.

She is survived by her husband, Ralph C. Hatley, Sumpter; one sister, Mrs. J. E. Stewart, Prineville, Ore.; two brothers, Frank Wald, Central Point, Ore., and Oscar Wald, Pendleton, Ore. Funeral services will be conducted from the Perl Funeral Home, Saturday at 11 a. m. Rev. Werner Jensen of the Zion Lutheran church officiating. Interment will take place in Siskiyou Memorial park.

Friends are respectfully invited to attend the funeral services.

Not Handcuffed The former gangster, who had served time for income tax law violations, was not handcuffed. He was guarded for his own protection, although Bennett said that he had not requested the escort.

With allowances for good behavior and credit for three days spent in jail in October, 1931, Capone's sentence expired November 16, 1939.

Gang Still Active Even as Capone was released, Captain Daniel Gilbert of the state's attorney's office in Chicago said of the recent assassination of Turfman Edward J. O'Hare:

"There's no longer any doubt about it being a Capone job." By "a Capone job," Gilbert said he meant to lay the killing at the door of what is left of the gangster organization Al Capone once ruled.
