

WINNERS LISTED IN HIGH SCHOOL BOOK WEEK TEST

Jean Henselman and Ted Gleason Write Best Promotional Papers in Test

Winners in the National Book Week contest, sponsored by the Senior high library in collaboration with the English and art departments, are Jean Henselman, first prize for best promotional book report, Ted Gleason, second prize for best book week poster, Robert Vroman was awarded first prize. Honorable mention was given Lillian Newton for a poster and to Geraldine Edwards for a book jacket. The announcement was made today by Miss Jacquie Kirtley, librarian.

All students in the English department submitted 100-word recommendations from which final winning papers were chosen. In the art department a large number of students made book covers and posters which are now on display at the high school. The contest, a special feature of book week November 12-18, was held to stimulate student interest in reading more and better books.

Winning book recommendations are:

Jean Henselman, first prize: "Undoubtedly one of the most fascinating and intriguing novels Alexandre Dumas ever penned, 'Count of Monte Cristo' stands out as an excellent example of both variety of characters and complications of plot. Emerging from a dreary dungeon where he spent nearly two decades in lonely imprisonment, Edmond Dantes launches upon his spectacular career as the possessor of a massive fortune. His burning desire for revenge upon those who sent him to that solitary cell and also robbed him of the woman he loved, is so overpowering that he returns to bring upon each, destruction. This book has lived through all ages and is still one of the 'must read' books of the day."

Ted Gleason, second prize: "For laughs and thrills, the very best of entertainment, there are few books that will excel 'The Adventures of Huckleberry Finn'. This book shows the picturesque life of the 'bare foot boy' of a bygone year. The author gives clear, vivid descriptions of life and nature as he witnessed them in his boyhood days. If you read the book, you will be carried away on a vagabond voyage with 'Huck' Finn down 'Old Man River', and through many hair-raising adventures, while the ever-present humor gives you laughs galore. Those who wish to read for entertainment should, at their first opportunity, room with Huckleberry Finn down the mighty Mississippi."

Young Mansfield, who was implicated in service station robbery here in August, 1938, made two trips to the store recently for purpose of night robbery, according to police, and on the third trip, Monday night, took young Peterson along as an accomplice.

Snow Flake PARTY TIPS

Party minded? How about a "Hard Times Party"? Write your invitations on wrapping paper, using a heavy pencil—"Come in Hard Times Costume (some of us can come as we are!). Dinner, such as it is, at seven."

I think you'll like buffet service. Dress your table in an old red and white checked tablecloth, candles in bottles, trays, tin cups and cracked plates. Serve from the kitchen or pantry.

You might start with the "soup line"—each with his tin cup to be filled with chilled tomato juice or a fruit beverage. For nibbles, have open a big red and white box of Snow Flake Crackers, alongside it a spread of perhaps cream cheese, minced clams and Worcestershire sauce. And here's your menu:

Main course—"A chicken in every pot"—(once a dream of us all!)

Buns, butter, jam
Dessert—Huge squares of hot gingerbread with whipped cream or hot chocolate fudge sauce.
Coffee.

Braised Chicken
Stuff a plump pullet with a dressing made of:
2 cups whole kernel corn
20 Snow Flake crackers, crumbled
1 teaspoon celery salt or 3 tablespoons minced celery
1/2 teaspoon salt
Pepper
1/2 cup melted butter
2 tablespoons minced green pepper
1 tablespoon chopped parsley
1/2 teaspoon mace if desired
Then put the chicken in a Dutch oven on top of 8 slices of bacon that you have just covered with 3 chopped carrots, 2 chopped onions and 5 tablespoons water. Sprinkle the chicken with a tablespoon of finely chopped parsley and a small bit of bay leaf. Cover it. Let cook steadily over slow heat for an hour. Then add 1 cup of boiling water, 1 cup strained tomato juice, 1/2 teaspoon salt and pepper to taste. Cover again and let chicken cook until tender. Serve on hot platter with crisped bacon or little sausages. Thicken remaining juices and vegetables to rich gravy. Serve with bread and butter pickles.

Bans Relief Autos
Cleveland — (U.P.) — Relief authorities here have ordered the impounding of license plates of relief clients and members of their families who own automobiles. SOCE BIOLOGIST SPEAKS AT MEET OF HEALTH ASSN.

Interesting Discussion of Hereditary Characteristics Given by Dr. Wayne Wells

That many of the feared recessive hereditary traits in mankind do not show up under normal conditions, was the cheering message brought to members of the Jackson County Public Health association by Dr. Wayne Wells, head of the biology department of Southern Oregon College of Education, Thursday afternoon. Dr. Wells spoke at the regular Thursday afternoon meeting of the association, arousing one of the most interesting discussions in many months of the organization's history. His subject was "Human Inheritance."

As heredity, he listed poor teeth, defective hair, short sightedness and long sightedness, general mentality and the susceptibility to numerous diseases. Many other tendencies, of course, were included in his list, some as "dominant" or seen whenever they exist, and others as "recessive," in danger of appearing in the next generation when unknown in the current one. All of these, he emphasized, are less apt to appear in dangerous form when the individual leads a normal and healthful life.

Work Reviewed
Preceding Dr. Wells' address a review of the past several months' work of the Jackson County Public Health department was given the association by Mrs. Blanche Friebe, supervisor of public health nurses. Her report showed a great increase in the number of pre-school clinics held in the county, also in immunizations and vaccinations. The county is now having four child guidance clinics each year and four crippled children's clinics. Four nurses were given additional education during the past year.

Mrs. J. C. S. Wells, president of the association, who presided at the meeting, announced that all schools in the county who have been financing additional nursing service, are repeating that service this year. She voiced the association's appreciation of the Armistice Day float, prepared by Miss Gladys Bengie of the Medford schools, and the Community Chest window, arranged by Mrs. Larry Ogle, also of the Medford school staff.

Luncheon Success
Mrs. R. E. Green, chairman of the community groups, announced a successful luncheon meeting with the community chairman preceding the regular meeting. She said that the growth of pre-school clinics throughout the county was due to the splendid work being carried on by the community group chairmen of the association.

Miss Helen Bullis, Jackson county chairman of the Christmas Seal Sale, thanked each community for the splendid preliminary work being done, adding that the seal sale will open November 30.

An interesting review of the meeting of the National Tuberculosis association in Boston was

made by Mrs. Wells, who attended as Jackson county delegate.

At the close of the program tea was served by the Central Point committee at a beautifully arranged Thanksgiving table. Mrs. Charles Taylor and Mrs. Gipson Driver poured.

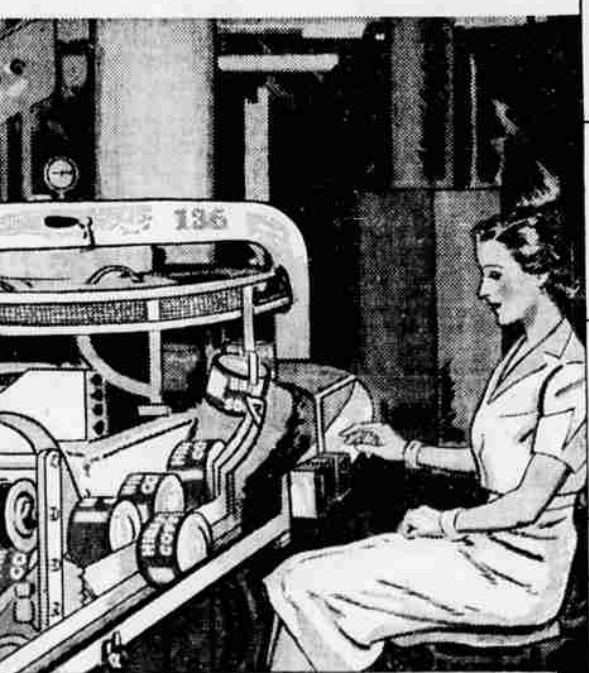
Drip Method: 5 to 8 minutes preferred. If less than 5 minutes is used, water will drip too fast giving weak brew.

PERCOLATOR: Start with cold or hot water. "Percolate" 10 to 15 minutes after steady pumping starts.

COFFEE POT: Bring coffee and water to boiling. Stir well. Add small amount of cold water and let stand 5 minutes to settle grounds.

STEeping: Pour boiling water on coffee. Stir well. Steep again in 5 minutes. Steep for a total of 10 to 15 minutes.
