

CALIFORNIA ENDS REGISTRY CHECK AT STATE BORDER

Economy Move Causes Abandoning Of Criticized Annoyance for Autoists

Sacramento, Nov. 17.—(AP)—All border checking stations have been ordered closed by the department of motor vehicles "in line with a drastic economy program necessitated by department budget reductions," Director Howard R. Philbrick announced.

The stations affected are at Dunsmuir, Truckee, Daggett, Yermo, Blythe and Yuma.

Those affected are the state vehicle department stations which check on the registration of incoming and outgoing automobiles after inspection by department of agriculture agents.

An estimated saving to taxpayers of \$75,000 a year, Philbrick said, "in the department's opinion justifies abandonment of the expensive and frequently criticized service which some motorists consider an annoyance."

Conference Announced

At the same time, Philbrick said a conference of California, Oregon, Washington and possibly Arizona and New Mexico officials will be held at Salem, Ore., Nov. 27 to discuss motor vehicle reciprocity regulations.

He said the chief problem has developed between Oregon and California following an opinion by Attorney General Earl Warren that Oregon's procedure does not accord full reciprocity to Californians operating north of the border in commercial vehicles. Warren will represent California at the conference.

Salem, Nov. 17.—(AP)—State officials will confer here November 27 with California officials over proposed reciprocal arrangements regarding motor vehicles.

Secretary of State Earl Snell said California wants to force Oregon truck owners to buy California license plates if they carry their products into that state.

Participating in the conference will be Snell, Superintendent of State Police Charles P. Fray, Attorney General I. H. Van Winkle, Attorney General Earl Warren of California, and Howard Philbrick, director of motor vehicles in California.

Jobless Horde Declared Due to School System

Babson Says High School Students Know More About Cheers Than Chores

Boston, Nov. 17.—(AP)—Asserting high school students "know more about cheers than chores," Roger Babson, investment specialist, charged today the school system in the United States was "primarily responsible for at least 7,000,000 of the 10,000,000 unemployed" in the nation.

Business men, he declared in a prepared address before the New England Association of School Superintendents, "are forced to cease to employ the young men and women emerging from a broken-down organization which has been despoiled by political raiders."

Ten Factors Listed

Babson listed 10 factors which he said contributed to unemployment, but added "the big reason is that young people are being graduated from our schools today as goods are being sold to department stores. Politically minded school committees are giving these children—not what untrained children need—but what misled parents think they want them to have."

"I insist that the growth of our country, which was so marked previous to 1930, was largely the result of the school system preceding 1915. Contrarywise, that the poor stock which has graduated since 1930 has largely been due to the decline—since 1915—in character of school committees."
