WEATHER PROBLEM SOLVED WITH NEW NASH WEATHER EYE

Outguessing the weather, a problem the weatherman finds too hard to solve, is part of the day's routine for Nash's improved new "Weather Eye" system of conditioning air for 1940.

According to Walter W. Abbey, local Nash dealer, with new headquarters at 123 South Riverside.

Although car weather-making is this ingenious device's No. 1 job, it does a lot of other things as it goes along. It keeps the air fresh and at the comfort level you like, it whisks out tobacco smoke, and it bans deadly carbon monoxide from the car.

The "Weather Eye," originally introduced by Nash Motors in 1938, is said to have reached a new high in comfort efficiency this year.

In the new 1940 Nash cars, the driving public will actually see the uncanny "Weather Eye," the alert weather watchman which automatically prevents changes in outside weather from affecting inside car comfort.

This device is mounted in a trim tenite cage on top of the instrument panel.

The car weather system proper—with its processed filter, rain shedder, conditioning chamber, sirocco fan and radiation vents—is located under the cowl.

It draws in large quantities (up to 600 cubic feet per minute) of fresh outside air through the opened cowl ventilator, routes it through the rain shedder to remove excess moisture, then through a purification filter, and then to a warming chamber where the air is heated to the comfort level specified by the driver—who has 11 choices, from Maytime coolness to hot.

A flick of a radio-like control dial is all that is necessary to set the system. The "Eye" automatically maintains the car comfort designated on the dial, regardless of outside temperature changes.

When the system is in operation, the cowl ventilator is kept open at all times, even in downpours, and the windows of the car kept closed. This results in draftless ventilation. The forward motion of the car forces large quantities of fresh air in through the open cowl; and when the car is standing, a powerful new sirocco fan pulls the outside air into the interior.

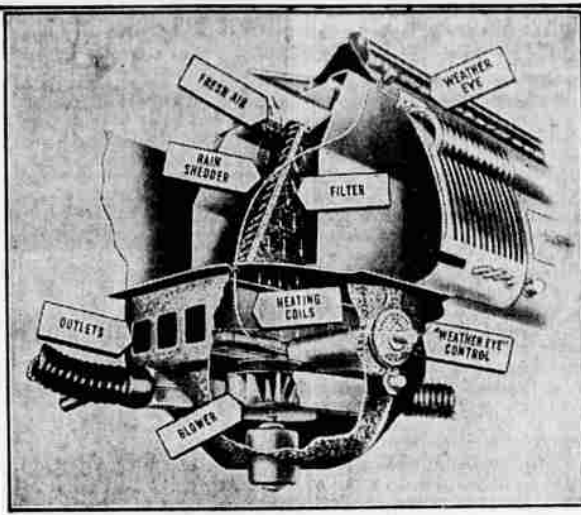
Air pressure inside the car is always slightly greater than outside pressure, naturally resulting in the constant movement of air outward through minute door and window vents. In the operation of most cars, forward motion creates a slight vacuum within the car, and air enters the car at every minute opening, creating a noisy in-drafts. The reverse is true with the new Nash "Weather Eye" system.

This is an important safety factor. Carbon monoxide tests show that while .02 per cent of carbon monoxide in a car interior is not dangerous, .03 and .04 per cent results in drowsiness and fatigue. From .04 to .07 per cent brings unconsciousness, and above that, death.

An additional comfort and safety feature of the "Weather Eye" system is the elimination of moisture-laden air that condenses on windows and windshield in cold weather. In exceptionally violent weather, powerful defrosters remove ice and sleet.

WIND AND WATER RAISE MERRY NED WITH FARM LAND

Washington, Nov. 18.—(AP)—The agriculture department is revamping its farm-aid program for 1940 to shift the emphasis from crop production control to measures designed to assure greater protection of the nation's soil resources from wind and water erosion.

Recent surveys show, officials said, that America's farming land is wearing out faster than it is being restored because farmers as a whole are not using cultivation practices which would prevent soil wastage.

Under tentative regulations drafted by the agricultural adjustment administration, farmers will be asked to devote more attention and efforts to conservation measures if they want to share the \$775,000,000 benefit payment fund.

Differing from past farm programs, farmers will have to do more than plant within acreage allotments given them for such major crops as cotton, wheat, corn, tobacco, potatoes, and peanuts, in order to obtain the maximum amount of subsidies.

They will be asked to increase their plantings of legumes and other soil-building crops, to return more land to grass and pastures, particularly land subject to erosion and unsuited for cultivation. Special efforts will be made to prevent overstocking and over-grazing of pastureland.

Officials said Secretary Wallace has taken the view that past conservation efforts have been wholly inadequate, making it the duty of governmental agencies to take steps to promote greater conservation.

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Motorists Welcome Reduction in Tire Prices Says Furnas

Announcement by The Goodyear Tire & Rubber Co., of drastic reductions in the consumer list price of tires and tubes has been enthusiastically received by residents of this area, according to Charles C. Furnas, proprietor of the Medford Service Station, local Goodyear dealer.

"The public seems appreciative of the fact that Goodyear has made this contribution toward price stabilization in the face of the current general upward trend," Mr. Furnas declared. "We have received many calls of commendation, but real proof of the way local motorists feel about the reductions is seen in the increase in sales since the new prices became effective on November 1."

"Coming at this time of year, when highways in many sections of the country are wet and slippery, the price reductions are especially important to car owners who realize that new tires, with sharp gripping treads, are the best possible protection against skids," Mr. Furnas said.

In the original announcement, President P. W. Litchfield of Goodyear explained that the reductions were made possible by savings in manufacturing costs resulting from modernization of the company's factories in Akron, Los Angeles, Jackson, Mich., and Gadsden, Ala., and by establishment of bulk plants at strategic points throughout the U. S. that have brought about a more simplified system of distribution. He also emphasized the company's belief that "this principle of immediately passing a legitimate share of such savings along to the public is consistent with enlightened economic policy and indispensable to the continuance of national recovery."

JAPANESE CLAIM 50 MILE ADVANCE IN CHINA THRUST

Hongkong, Nov. 18.—(AP)—The Japanese army announced today that it had made a 50-mile advance in four days and entered Kwangsi province in its thrust at China's southwestern "lifeline" supply routes.

If this is true Kwangsi, famed for its fighting men, becomes 14th of China's 24 provinces to be invaded since the Japanese began in July, 1937, their effort to conquer China.

The announcement came from the headquarters on Dragon Head island of the expedition which Wednesday effected a landing under the guns of a fleet on the western Kwangtung province coast only 35 miles from the French Indo-China border.

The Japanese said they had captured a Kwangsi walled town only 30 miles from Nanning, chief military center of the province from which run a narrow gauge railway and a highway into French Indo-China. Vital supplies have been reaching the Chinese army over these routes.

HOT LOVE NOTES FIGURE IN ALASKA MURDER TRIANGLE

Seward, Alaska, Nov. 18.—(AP)—Murder charges against Gena Hallett in connection with the disappearance of his wife were nearly ready for jury consideration tonight.

Both sides in the case rested before noon today, with arguments expected to consume less than a day. Previously, the prosecution had succeeded in having inserted in the record texts of fervid love letters allegedly written by Hallett, 42-year old Kodiak island boat owner, to one Jessie Dresslein, then at Bellingham, at about the time Hallett's wife, Iva, 50, disappeared a year ago. Her body was never found.

Deputy United States Marshal M. P. Smith testified that Hallett had told him he had discovered his wife's body in a creek, rowed with it into an island bay and there lost it overboard in heavy seas. District Attorney J. W. Kehoe had previously testified Hallett first declared his wife had departed on a boat that stopped at Larson bay and later had changed his story, relating that he had found her dead on the beach and had lost the body in heavy seas.

Miss Dresslein, 38, is at liberty under bond as a material witness in the case.
