

GRANGE PROPOSES BOARD TO CONTROL IMPORTS, EXPORTS

Resolution Before National Convention Urges End Of Trade Agreements.

Peoria, Ill., Nov. 21.—(AP)—Creation of a non-partisan body with broad powers to regulate imports and exports was proposed today by the foreign relations committee of the National Grange.

The proposal was placed before the organization's 71st annual convention in the form of a resolution which also urged congress to terminate trade agreements now in force or pending under the reciprocal trade act.

Contending the trade agreements and the most favored nation clause had increased foreign competition for American farmers, the committee expressed opposition to renewal of the

trade act upon its expiration in June, 1940.

Responsible To Congress
The Grange adopted the resolution during the morning session.

The proposed trade board would be responsible to congress and "broadly representative of all American producing and consuming interests, properly co-ordinated with the tariff commission, with powers to regulate imports and exports within prescribed limitations and with power to promote and encourage exchanges of goods advantageous to the American people."

The Grange adopted a resolution urging an adequate protective tariff on all imported commodities competing with American produced starch.

"Drums Along the Mohawk" and "Mother Goose Goes Hollywood" will be at the Craterian Theatre through Saturday night and, judging from the shattered records that have been greeting the thrilling color hit, patrons are advised to go early to avoid the crowds.

LAST MEMBER OF ASHLAND G. A. R. IS LAID TO REST

Ashland, Nov. 21.—(Spl.)—Funeral services were held in the Dodge chapel this afternoon for Daniel L. Glenn, 95, last surviving member of Burnside post, Grand Army of the Republic. The Rev. Melville T. Wire, pastor of the Methodist church, officiated. Burial took place in the Ashland cemetery.

Mr. Glenn died in a hospital here Sunday night a few days after he had suffered a fractured hip in a fall. He had been a resident of Ashland since 1893. He was born December 12, 1844, in Claremont county, Ohio, and moved with his family to Indiana when he was five years old. When the Civil war broke out, he enlisted with company K, 82nd Indiana regiment and earned the rank of corporal. He served in the Union army three years, was wounded at Chickamauga September 20, 1864, and at Atlanta August 7, 1864.

In 1872 Mr. Glenn and Mary Catherine Hargrove were married. In 1889 the family moved to western Washington and from there to Ashland in 1893. Mr. Glenn was a building contractor, a business he engaged in for many years after coming here.

Survivors are a daughter Mrs. T. H. Simpson of Ashland, three sisters, Mrs. H. M. Bear of Lynwood, Cal., Mrs. Myra Johnson of Lodi, Cal., and Mrs. Belle Byfield of Tulsa, Okla., a niece Mrs. H. J. Carter of Ashland, two grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.
