

STORK DELIVERS 5 BOYS IN A DAY FOR NEW RECORD

An innovation in stork sendings took place yesterday, Saturday, December 2, in Sacred Heart hospital when five baby boys were born.

Hospital attendants report that five babies in one day is not common and that five boys is really some record.

Mr. and Mrs. P. K. Jones of Brownsville topped the list of parents by having twins. They weigh six pounds, 12 1/2 ounces and six pounds, 7 1/2 ounces. The Jones have not named the new arrivals as yet because they were so surprised at having twins and only one name picked out. They are also the parents of two girls.

Others becoming parents yesterday were Roy and Mrs. Wrenner Jensen whose son weighs five and a half pounds. Roy Jensen is pastor of the Zion Lutheran church and the family resides at 518 West Fourth street.

The new baby of Mr. and Mrs. Fred Schneider of 1619 North Riverside avenue weighs seven pounds, seven ounces and Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Burns of 524 North Bartlett street are the parents of the fifth boy weighing eight pounds, four ounces.

Hospital attendants report that groups of girl babies are often born the same day. However they still contend that the quintet of males is some record.

YOUTH FALLS OFF MILK TRUCK, HURT

After spending Friday night in Community hospital with injuries he received when he fell off a milk truck at Hamilton and 11th street late Friday afternoon, Dick Milestone, 17, of Beall lane returned to his home Saturday afternoon with no more serious hurts than a badly bruised chest and a sore side.

The rear wheel of the truck grazed his side and chest as he lay on the ground, and he was taken to the hospital in the Port ambulance.

COUNTY PAYMENTS OPPOSED IN SUIT

Portland, Dec. 2.—(AP)—A suit to prohibit Multnomah county from paying dues in the Association of Oregon Counties was filed in circuit court today by U. G. Walker, described only as a taxpayer.

He charged payment of the dues would increase taxes. Dues are \$30 monthly.

Frank L. Shull, chairman of the board of county commissioners, said the attorney general had ruled the association was a proper function of county governments.

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OUTGOING MAIL MAKES BIG GAIN

Medford's postoffice enjoyed a substantial gain in outgoing airmail during November, according to figures compiled Saturday by Hugo Guenther, superintendent of mails. During the month, 2354 pounds of airmail was dispatched, an increase of 715 pounds or 46.3 per cent over November of 1938 when 1509 pounds was loaded aboard planes here. Figuring 30 letters to the pound, the increase would amount to 22,350 letters.

Stamp sales also increased in November, figures furnished by R. G. Beach, assistant postmaster, showing \$10,477.76 total compared with \$9,793.62 in the same month last year, an increase of \$684.14, or seven per cent.

RESIDENTS ASKED TO RAKE LEAVES

With strong winter winds due to sweep down on Medford in the near future, the city superintendent's office yesterday requested property owners to sweep up and destroy all leaves in their yards as soon as possible.

It was explained that the town would be considerably cluttered up if leaves were still laying on the ground when the wind started to blow with full force.
