NEGRO WILL TRY TO SNAP BOZELL'S WINNING STREAK

Bob Chick Returns To Face Kenaston — Parks And Rogers Meet In Opener.

King Kong Clayton, the ebony grappling streak from Birpingham and Paul Bozell, Boston crab expert with the unbeaten record, come together in the armory main event tonight, and Promoter Mack Lillard confidently expects the match to develop into one of the finest seen here in the past several months. The program starts at 8 o'clock sharp.

Sgt. Bob Kenaston, Gold Hill bad boy, will play the part of the second part when Bobby Chick, popular ex-light heavyweight champion, steps in the local squared circle for the first time in two years. During the past 24 months Chick, elder brother of Dude, has been working in the east and middle west, and his return will be welcomed by all lovers of legitimate and spectacular grappling.

Popeye Sick Popeye Pat O'Brien, originally slated to meet Herb Parks in the opener, was forced to cancel the engagement when he contracted the flu, and his place will be taken by Eddie Rogers of Michigan, who battled Parks last week.

Tonight's card will see two matches staged along clean-meanie lines, with only the opener providing 100 per cent scientific action. In the main event Bozell will provide the off-color tactics, with Clayton attempting to win via legitimate tactics. The center attraction will pit Kenaston's dirt against Chick's science.

Because he will boast a weight advantage and superior strength Bozell is a slight vocal favorite to continue his winning streak at the expense of the Negro flash in the top go. However, many addicts are confident Clayton's speed and all-around wrestling ability will enable him to overcome Bozell's heft and brute strength. 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FOOTBALL SEASON NEARS CLIMAX IN VARIOUS 'BOWLS'

Georgia Tech To Play In Orange Bowl; Arizona State Host In Sun Bowl.

By Hugh S. Fullerton, Jr. New York, Dec. 4.—(U.P.)—The 1939 football parade now heads for a New Year, with appropriate opening ceremonies in various "bowls" on New Year's Day.

There will be a couple of side excursions next week to decide championship races in the Southeastern and Pacific Coast conferences, but that is all there is left in winding up the season. Already two teams have been named for the post-season clashes. Georgia Tech, certain to get at least a tie for the Southeastern conference crown, accepted an invitation to appear in Miami's Orange Bowl as soon as it finished the regular season Saturday by beating Georgia, 13-0. Arizona State of Tempe automatically earned a spot in the Sun Bowl at El Paso, Tex., when it won the Border conference title.

Cornell Eastern Champs The other sectional champions are: East (unofficial)—Cornell. Southern conference (unofficial)—Duke and Clemson. (Both undefeated in conference. Duke had one more victory). Big Ten—Ohio State. Big Six—Missouri. Missouri Valley—Washington University. Southwest—Texas A. and M. Mountain States Big Seven—Colorado. Rocky Mountains—Colorado Mines.

The Pacific coast conference title will be decided Saturday in the meeting between two unbeaten teams, Southern California and U.C.L.A. Texas A. and M. Unbeaten The Texas Aggies, who won the Southwest title and their tenth straight game by beating Texas, 20-0, Nov. 30, are in the running. Other outstanding teams that finished their seasons without a defeat or a tie are Cornell (which is cold to post-season bids), Colorado Mines, and San Jose (Calif.) State. Duquesne, which staged a fine comeback Saturday to gain a 10-10 tie with Detroit in its final regular-season game, and Georgetown are among the unbeaten but tied teams.

Portland, Dec. 4.—(U.P.)—A crowd of 6,200 northwest fans roared approval yesterday of professional football as the Los Angeles American league Bulldogs outscored the Columbus Bullies, 19-17. The engagement produced scores in every period, including four field goals by the Bulldogs and one by Columbus. Manton's 11-yard boot in the fourth period won the game. The Bullies scored a touchdown in the first minute, after a 70-yard Williams-to-Busch pass put the ball on the Los Angeles 4. Peterson converted. Los Angeles bounced back with a touchdown on the kickoff—a 96-yard run by Hutchinson behind perfect interference. Trojans Want Vols in Rose Bowl; UCLA Favors Aggies

Pasadena, Calif., Dec. 4.—(U.P.)—Officially, all is silence. But unofficially that great annual guessing game, "who will play in the Rose Bowl?" is getting under way.

The western entry remains to be chosen when Southern California and the University of California at Los Angeles meet next Saturday. Both are undefeated. They will settle the Pacific coast conference crown, and, automatically, the west's defender of its honor in the annual New Year's Day classic of the Arroyo Seco.

Bill Ackerman, UCLA's graduate manager, turned off an effort to pin him on the Bruins' preference with: "We plan to wait 'til we have the right to extend a bid before we do so." Officials at Southern California were equally uncommunicative.

But the boys who know say that if S. C. wins Saturday, Tennessee will be the choice. The Trojans drew some criticism last year for inviting Duke over the unbeaten Vols.

As for UCLA, rumor has it that those in control look kindly on Texas Aggies. Texas teams are highly popular out this way, and plenty of pressure is exerted by a vociferous contingent from the Lone Star state whenever an undefeated team bobs up in that sector. The Bruins hold one decision this season over a Texas team, Texas Christian.

Paul Zimmerman, sports editor of the Los Angeles Times, theorized thus: "If the Trojans are elected by the coast conference, we'll see Tennessee just as sure as shooting fish, and if the Uclans win, the pendulum is apt to swing the Texas (Aggies) way, although that isn't final by any means."

GAELS END POOR YEAR BY THUMPING LOYOLA Los Angeles, Dec. 4.—(U.P.)—St. Mary's Gaels ended a poor season Sunday by pounding out a 40-7 football victory over Loyola's weak Lions before a crowd of 10,000.

UP-AND-DOWN DONS TAKE FINAL TUSSLE

Sacramento, Cal., Dec. 4.—(U.P.) An up-and-down football season was over for the University of San Francisco Dons today, with a 26 to 14 victory over Creighton university, the last on the books.

The Dons banged over four touchdowns in a lively second half to beat the Nebraskans yesterday in a charity game before a crowd of 10,000.

San Francisco closed its season with four victories, three defeats and two ties. Creighton has won four and lost five.
