LAKE CREEK MAN FINDS WEATHER BUREAU SKY BOX

Mark Hoefft of Lake Creek is the lucky finder of another radio graph sent up from the United States weather bureau here on November 3.

The instrument, used by the bureau to chart meteorological conditions, was found on November 22 by Mr. Hoefft when he was riding for cattle near Butte Falls. The location is approximately thirty miles airline from Medford.

The finder reported the box in good condition, although the cover was mutilated, evidently by rats. The small aluminum colored boxes, containing delicate instruments for recording meteorological data, have a metallic foil coating.

Mr. Hoefft, as per instructions on the box, will send it to Baltimore to receive a reward of from \$1 to \$20, depending upon the condition of the instruments.

Anaheim, Calif., Dec. 4.—(AP) It was really "pennies from heaven" for Leroy Henderson, 14.

The boy looked skyward to see a red parachute descending in a neighbor's yard. Investigating, he found an aluminum box containing an automatic weather broadcaster showing it had been released from some Pacific coast federal meteorological station Nov. 8.

Remnants of a rubber balloon told a story of its ascendancy to an altitude so high there no longer was sufficient atmospheric pressure to sustain it and it burst, releasing the parachute and box.

\$245 BOUNTY PAID DURING NOVEMBER

Jackson county paid out \$245 during November as bounty for coyotes and bobcats. This is an increase over October. The county court returned to the bounty system for the three winter months.

Vern Hopkins of the Dead Indian district today turned in 14 coyotes and five bobcats, and received a \$54.50 warrant. Hopkins is rated one of the best varmint catchers in the county.

Trappers report this winter the prices for coyote, bobcat and other pelts are higher than a year ago.

SOIL CONSERVATION PAYS FARMERS \$2896

Checks for bonus payments for this year, amounting to \$2,896.54 have been received to date by Jackson county farmers, under the agricultural soil conservation act, the county agent's office reports.

The 1938 payments have been completed, and amounted to \$60,000, it is reported.

GOVERNMENT WINS IMPORTANT STEP IN WAR ON TRUSTS

High Court Upholds Prosecution Of Alleged Fixing Of Chicago Milk Prices.

Washington, Dec. 4.—(AP)—The government won in the supreme court today in its effort to prosecute anti-trust proceedings charging a group of corporations, organizations and individuals with conspiracy to fix milk prices, control the supply and suppress competition in the Chicago area.

Chief Justice Hughes delivered the opinion in the litigation—one of the major cases brought by the department of justice in its recent anti-trust campaign.

No dissent was announced.

The chief justice said the agricultural marketing agreement act "affords no ground for construing the Sherman act as inapplicable" to the charges against the defendants.

His opinion also expressed the same view as to other farm legislation enacted since the 1890 Sherman act was passed. A national labor relations board order directing the Newport News Shipbuilding and Drydock company to disestablish an employees' representative committee as collective bargaining agency for the workmen was sustained by the supreme court.

Justice Roberts delivered the opinion that reversed a ruling by the fourth federal circuit court that the company did not have to withdraw recognition from the labor organization.

No dissent was announced.

Interference barred. "The law," Justice Roberts said in his decision in the Newport News case, "provides that an employee organization shall be free from interference or

dominance by the employer. "We cannot say" that, upon the uncontradicted facts, the board erred in its conclusion that the purpose of the law could not be attained without complete disestablishment of the existing organization which had been dominated and controlled to a greater or less extent by the respondent.

"In applying the statutory test of independence it is immaterial that the plan had in fact not engendered, or indeed had obviated, serious labor disputes in the past, or that any company interference in the administration of the plan had been incidental rather than fundamental and with good motives. It was for congress to determine whether, as a matter of policy, such a plan should be permitted to continue in force, and that the board's conclusions are in accord with that purpose."

EVERETT TAYLOR PASSES SUDDENLY

Everett Edward Taylor, a resident of southern Oregon for over 40 years, passed away suddenly at the home of Harry Dunning, 233 South Riverside avenue, Saturday at the age of 62.

Mr. Taylor was born in Decatur county, Indiana, January 15, 1877. He followed prospecting and mining most of his life, and knew the southern Oregon country well. He loved the mountains and streams, and was not happy unless he was prospecting.

He leaves two sisters, Mrs. Grace Haynes, of Eagle Point, Mrs. Nettie Morse, of Burbank, Calif., two brothers, M. J. Taylor, of Hermiston, Ore., and Albert A. Taylor of Arizona.

Funeral services will be conducted from the Perl Funeral Home Tuesday at 2 p. m., Rev. V. C. Beecraft of the Seventh Day Adventist church officiating. Interment will take place in the Medford I.O.O.F. cemetery.

Hedrick today announced the appointment of Miss Edna Breeding, a graduate of Linfield college in 1933, to the teaching position of Medford senior high school made vacant by the tragic death last week of Dorothy Young, who was killed in an auto accident near the county poor farm that also took the life of her mother.

Miss Breeding will teach bookkeeping, typing and other commercial work in the senior high school, and elementary business training in the junior high school.

Miss Breeding has had five years teaching experience. Mr. Hedrick stated, and comes here from Wenatchee, Wash. high school, where she resigned upon receiving the offer of the position here. She arrived by plane Thursday and assumed her new duties Friday. Her home is in McMinnville.
