London, Dec. 8.—(P)—The four principal British railroads agreed today to wage increases which will add approximately 1,000,000 pounds (about \$4,000,000) a year to their payrolls. The companies accepted the findings of a national tribunal which make the new rates effective from October 28.

## GUARD COMPANIES IN FIELD TRAINING DURING WEEK-END

Area From Medford to Eagle Point Will Be Utilized For Simulated Warfare.

Commencing at five o'clock this evening both local guard companies of the National Guard will participate in the third phase of the National limited emergency mobilization, when the local troops will be assembled at the Army for a three day field training period.

Immediately after establishing camp night maneuvers will be taken up and the following two days will be spent in the field. This is part of a national training program carried on simultaneously throughout the country for the purpose of bringing the training of the National Guard troops up to as high a point as possible under the limited time allotted for training purposes.

**Last Phase**  
Each week end for the past two weeks the local troops have been assembled at the Army and this week's training is the last one to be ordered for the present. It is planned during this last phase to work out some rather intricate military problems and in all probability an area extending from Medford to Eagle Point will be used, including a river crossing and defense of a railroad.

During the maneuvers the troops are quartered in the Medford Armory where kitchens and sleeping facilities have been set up. Approximately one hundred local soldiers are taking part in the training.

**The Forest Fire Menace**  
To the Editor:

News item of Dec. 1 says 40 CCC men were used to control a fire on upper Applegate. The item also states the fire was confined to ground cover, doing no damage to the live timber. If this same fire had occurred during the driest part of last season 400 men could not have saved any of the timber in the area burned over. But if at this time the fire had been spread by the men instead of confined and the debris of brush, dead logs, leaves, etc., burned up then the timber there would be fairly safe from a disastrous fire for

several years. The accumulation of ground cover is what produces disastrous fires.

Go out into a group of ripe old-growth trees. Look for signs of ancient fires on the trunks of the live trees and on the ground. Yes, you can find them almost anywhere. Very likely a number of fires have passed that way since those trees came into existence. But now they have been protected from fire for 30 or 40 years. The ground cover has been built up to where just one more dry season fire and they would be completely destroyed. Isn't it about time the forest service woke up or else are they going on pre-serving the ground cover from year to year so that if, or rather one might say, when fire comes during the dry season everything in its path will be destroyed. Sometime the fire will come.

I wonder how many of us realize that in the last few years more timber has been destroyed by fire on the Pacific slope than has been sawed into lumber.

Even though the fire fighting crews have been greatly increased, each year sees more and more disastrous fires. This is not because of drier years but rather because the accumulation of ground cover makes fire uncontrollable.
