\$7500 AWARDED IN CRASH DEATH

A jury award of \$7500 in favor of A. J. Ellenberger, ex-Ashland resident, as administrator of the estate of his son was returned today following the decision of Attorneys Gus and Don Newbury from Bend where they conducted the damage suit for the plaintiff in the DeSutes county circuit court last week. The suit was directed against L. A. W. Nixon and a number of timber companies for whom Nixon worked. A. J. Ellenberger was seriously injured and his son Samuel was killed near Bend in September, 1938, when Nixon's car ran into the truck and trailer in which the Ellenberger family was moving from Ashland to eastern Oregon. Newbury & Newbury instituted damage proceedings and last May a jury brought in a verdict of \$12,000 in favor of A. J. Ellenberger. Last week's suit followed with A. J. Ellenberger suing as administrator of his son's estate.
