

Ickes Jabs G. O. P. Hopefuls In Arguing for Third Term

Newark, N. J., Dec. 12.—(AP)—Secretary Ickes in an address last night, filled with barbed references to Republican aspirants for the presidential nomination, urged a third term for President Roosevelt as the "preservation of our democracy against perils that threaten it."

The secretary of the interior told 3,500 persons at a town hall meeting a third term was consistent with true American democracy.

General Hugh Johnson, who spoke with Ickes on the subject, "Is Democracy in Peril?" retorted immediately another term would tend to perpetuate a Roosevelt dynasty in the White House.

"It undoubtedly is possible to re-elect President Roosevelt," Johnson replied to the same audience-question asked Ickes. "That would mean a fourth term perhaps, a fifth and so on until the fifteenth. Finally, they'll elect Jimmy Roosevelt (the President's oldest son) and start all over again."

Ickes launched his whole criticism of Republican hopefuls by asserting an "actual starvation crisis" existed in Cleveland "because a Republican governor, Mr. Bricker, deliberately chose to risk starvation rather than spoil his selfish plan for a budget balancing record in his own state."

The governor replied, accusing new dealers of "playing politics with human misery." "There has been no starvation in Cleveland; no neglect of

relief in Ohio," Gov. Bricker said. "Ickes is simply endeavoring to smear the good name of Ohio for a third term ballyhoo."

Earlier the governor, who refused pleas from several Ohio cities for a special session of the legislature, observed "all blasts against us" have come from new dealers. He referred to Ickes, President Roosevelt and Mayor Fiorello La Guardia of New York.

OHIO GOVERNOR SAYS NEW DEALERS PLAYING POLITICS WITH MISERY

Cleveland, Dec. 12.—(AP)—Cleveland's 1939 relief troubles apparently were solved today by city-federal action, but the Ohio situation remained in the national spotlight as Secretary of the Interior Ickes and Gov. John W. Bricker clashed again over the state's attitude.

DAHACK KILLING IS INVESTIGATED BY GRAND JURY

The grand jury, Royal G. Brown, Eagle Point, Foreman, convened this morning to investigate the circumstances surrounding the death of Zera E. Dahack, killed a week ago in a gun battle with state police, near his upper Lake Creek cabin. The shooting followed the seizure under a search warrant of 187 pounds of deer meat, found on the Dahack premises.

A coroner's jury returned findings last Tuesday that Dahack came to his death from gunshot wounds, and hemorrhages resulting therefrom, and held Game Warden Ed Walker and State Policeman George Albright blameless. Dahack, according to the testimony, had waited for the two officers, following the search, and from behind a tree with a rifle, commanded them "to unload that venison in ten seconds, or I'll kill you."

The testimony further showed that Walker attempted to dissuade Dahack, who fired the

first shot. In the return fire Dahack was killed. Among witnesses scheduled to appear are State Policemen Walker and Albright, Irwin Dahack, a brother of deceased, who appeared on the scene shortly afterwards; Nye Matthews and H. H. Fox, residents of the Eagle Point district. The district attorney has urged all persons desiring to appear before the grand jury, with evidence they may have, to do so.
