

### RED CROSS SPENDING OVER HALF MILLION FOR WAR SUFFERERS

Washington, Dec. 13.—(AP)—President Roosevelt reported today the American Red Cross, of which he is president, has spent or is spending over \$500,000 for relief of persons in European war areas.

Of that, he said at his press conference, \$25,000 has been sent to Finland for civilian uses and \$16,000 has been applied to the purchase of medicines in London for shipment to Finland.

Asked whether he had anything to say about the undertaking of former President Hoover in raising funds for Finnish relief, the chief executive said he thought it was fine and that he understood Hoover had been cooperating with the Red Cross.

He said he thought the former president had been consulting with Red Cross officials for about two months.

The Red Cross central committee has appropriated \$1,000,000 for war relief in Europe, including Finland, Mr. Roosevelt said.

### OREGON PRAYERS ASKED FOR FINNS

Salem, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Gov. Charles A. Sprague today designated next Sunday as Finland Day in Oregon, asking citizens to pray for the Finnish non-combatants and to contribute toward the relief of Finland's war victims.

Ex-President Herbert Hoover, chairman of the Finnish relief fund, asked all governors to make such proclamations.

"I ask all mayors of the cities of this state to make similar announcements," the governor said.

"On this day citizens are requested to appeal for divine protection of the Finnish non-combatants. They are also urged to contribute toward the relief of Finland's war sufferers."

### FEWER APPLES IN STORAGE PLANTS

Washington, Dec. 13.—(AP)—The agriculture department reported today cold storage holdings of apples in this country totaled 30,748,000 bushels on December 1, or about 67,000 bushels less than on the same date last year.

The quantity in storage on this date during the 1934-38 period averaged 31,478,000 bushels.

The holdings by states included Washington 10,980,000 bushels; California, 1,795,000; Oregon, 1,135,000; Virginia, 3,346,000; Michigan, 1,000,000; Pennsylvania, 1,710,000; New York, 5,403,000; New Jersey, 958,000.

### HIGH COURT RULES ON FEDERAL WORKER TAX

Salem, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Salaries earned by employees of federal corporations before January 1, 1939, are exempt from state taxation, the state supreme court ruled today.

Salaries earned after that date are taxable by the state under recent federal legislation, just as salaries of state employees became subject to federal taxes at that time.

Washington, Dec. 13.—(AP)—The Federal Monopoly Committee called representatives of some of the nation's foremost financial houses today for an inquiry into the investment banking business, covering principally the extent to which control may be concentrated.

## Soy Bean Menu Offers Cereal, 'Meat', Beverage

Asheville, N. C.—(AP)—It used to be that a self-respecting cow wouldn't eat the lowly soy bean unless it was exceedingly hungry. But today this once-detestable food is being made to perform a variety of dietetic functions at the home of Jay N. Judd.

Judd is a farmer. He also is one of the growing battalion of men who have taken upon themselves the job of preaching this gospel: "The soy bean is the greatest health food on earth. Eat it." And Judd practices what he preaches.

In some form, soy bean is the base—and often an embellishment—of three meals a day seven days a week in the Judd household.

He's manufacturing about two dozen different products from the peanut-sized bean, and that's just a beginning of what he hopes to do during the next few months.

Judd says there's a "gold mine" for the Southland in this crop if the people can be convinced that the bean is good. Extensive consumption of the bean, he asserted, has greatly improved his health.

"There's soy bean milk, for instance," Judd said. "Not only does it look like cow's milk but it actually curdles when it gets a few days old. From this milk my wife makes cottage cheese, butter, and several other things.

"Then there's soy bean oil. We use that for making mayonnaise, seasoning cakes, flavoring salads and ordinary cooking purposes.

"Soy bean malt serves the purpose of standard malts. We have a soy bean breakfast cereal from which we make muffins. Our pancakes are made of soy bean flour.

"As a matter of fact, you can almost add 'soy bean' to everything we eat."

Even coffee is being made from the bean at Judd's home. Actually, it doesn't taste like coffee but — take it from the Judd family—it makes as tasty a beverage, hot or cold.

Soy beans — crushed and baked by his particular formula—often serve as the meat dish on Judd's table. Judd says it tastes like pork, "only it's better."

### WHEAT PRICE UPTURN GIVES FARMERS HUGE MARGIN ABOVE LOANS

Chicago, Dec. 13.—(AP)—A paper profit of approximately \$25,000,000, less interest and storage charges, has accrued to the account of American farmers who are holding wheat off the market under government loans, grain men estimated today.

A sharp upturn in the price of wheat the past two weeks has lifted market quotations 10 to 20 cents above rates at which the government has lent \$112,000,000 on 161,000,000 bushels stored on farms and in warehouses. If producers wish they can redeem this wheat by paying off loans, interest and storage charges. Then they can sell at market.

Grain men pointed out, however, that if this were done on a large scale market prices probably would be affected. Nevertheless, some growers with long Christmas shopping lists have taken advantage of the opportunity.

The loan program, designed to enable producers to delay marketing until prices are advantageous, already has given farmers control of their wheat six months or more after harvest in some cases.

Loans will not mature until April 30, 1940.

### BRITAIN, FRANCE CUT FAR EASTERN FORCES

Shanghai, Dec. 13.—(AP)—Great Britain and France were reported today to be reducing still further their Far Eastern forces, Britain removing three of five gunboats on the Yangtze and the French slashing their Hankow garrison to 50 men.

(Britain announced November 13 only sufficient troops would be kept in north China to "maintain order.")

### CANADA SENDS U.S. HUGE GOLD CARGO

Washington, Dec. 13.—(AP)—A huge Canadian shipment lifted American gold import figures up to pre-war levels last week.

Imports in the seven days ended December 6 totalled \$141,996,834, of which \$115,176,653 came from Canada. The figure, almost twice the total for the preceding week, was more than 10 times as big as that for some recent weeks.

Although officials declined to guess the purpose of the Canadian shipment, they indicated most of it was placed on deposit at the New York Federal Reserve bank, where it would be handy for cash payment on airplane purchases.

### GERMANY AIDING REDS IS CLAIM OF BRITISH

London, Dec. 13.—(AP)—The British foreign office said tonight it had confirmed that Germany was making full use of her strategic position to prevent war materials reaching Finland from other countries "anxious to prove their sympathy."

"Germany now has come out openly on the side of the aggressor," a foreign statement said. "Germany indeed is holding up orders placed in neutral countries before the war and is proudly asserting the fact."
