RILEY ADDRESSES ROTARY MEETING AND C-C LEADERS

Frank Branch Riley, Oregon's famed "ambassador" who has long spread the glories of this state in eastern cities, delivered an inspirational address before the Medford Rotary club at the luncheon-meeting of that organization Tuesday noon. The Rotarians and guests, assembled at the Hotel Medford, heard the distinguished lecturer describe Oregon as the "art gallery of the Almighty" and point to the chamber of commerce of a live city as "the powerhouse of a community."

"Caesar is in the throne and democracy is on the scaffold," Mr. Riley told the Rotarians. "The government of the people, for the people and by the people has perished from much of the earth," he said. "Let us resolve never to again become foreign missionaries, for if we are again involved in war, it will mean certain dictatorship," he urged.

Riley pointed out that, in this nation, the rulers are the servants of the people and of their own choosing. He stressed the importance of "keeping America safe for democracy, by ridding the nation of every semblance of religious intolerance, maintaining labor peace, which is, after all, a first requisite of national defense, and public opposition of so-called 'pressure groups' who would further their own selfish interests through discriminatory legislation."

The speaker cited examples of this type of legislation which crept into Oregon politics last year. In concluding his address, Mr. Riley urged the elimination of state trade barriers, which seriously affect the harmony between the various states and hamper free interchange of trade.

Following the Rotary meeting, the lecturer met a group of Jackson County Chamber of Commerce officials in an informal discussion of Oregon promotional plans.

Scrip Books For Xmas Gifts

Long Awaited Film G.W.T.W. Wins Previewers' Plaudits

Hollywood, Dec. 13.—(AP)—"Gone With the Wind" is now ready for all those who always intended to read the book, but never got around to it, as well as for the vast number of faithful readers who wondered how Hollywood would treat it. Its 1,037 pages finally have been compressed into a motion picture, and it is no ordinary picture. The long-awaited film was press-reviewed yesterday, as a prelude to its world premiere next Friday in Atlanta, Ga., its very locale and the home of author Margaret Mitchell. No film which caused so much speculation about treatment and casting, before production, and which runs for three hours and 57 minutes, in its final form, belongs in the everyday classification. For these reasons alone, it is an out-of-the-ordinary event. The professional flaw-finders, on the whole, were enthusiastic. Perfect Scarlett. All previewers left the theater seemingly agreed that Vivien Leigh, although English-trained and "unknown" in this country, was the logical choice for the role of Scarlett O'Hara. Sometimes she was restrained, but mostly she was the dashing, fiery Scarlett. (The character of Rhett Butler was tailored for Clark Gable, nearly everyone always said; the author must have had in mind somebody very much like him. He is Rhett.) Other performances, specifically those of Hattie McDaniel (Mammy) and Leslie Howard (Ashley Wilkes), are all that can be expected. There are about 100 speaking roles. "Gone" is strikingly told in technicolor; photographic experts say they consider it the best color job to date. There are many spectacular scenes, notably those of the burning and siege of Atlanta, of the plantation Tara and of the wounded and dying at the railroad station after the siege. MEDFORD TOPS IN EXPRESSING OUT PEAR GIFT BOXES

A. L. Hammell, vice-president of the Railway Express Agency, arrived in Medford this morning by train to transact business and call on fruit growers and inspectors in the valley. Mr. Hammell's visit here is in conjunction with the Agency's handling of Christmas pear gift boxes which many of the packing concerns are selling this year. The visitor said that the gift box pear industry here is the largest operation of the kind in the west, even surpassing the citrus fruit in other states. It was due to the large volume of gift box production last year that the express agency's business increased 53 per cent, Mr. Hammell said. He went on to state that further increases are anticipated. The agency has sent over a dozen men to the valley this year to handle the fruit box shipping. Also arriving this morning with Mr. Hammell were J. C. North, western traffic manager, and L. P. Bergman, general manager of the agency, all from San Francisco. The principal ports of Ulster, Ireland, are Belfast, Londonderry, Coleraine and Newry. Belfast is the most important of them.
