Graf Spee May Try Dash From Montevideo Trap

The dock alongside the ship to carry 36 pine coffins to North cemetery in the heart of Montevideo.

The admiral Graf Spee's commander, Captain Hans Langsdorff, turned out the ship's band to play a dirge and 100 seamen to escort the bodies. The normal crew complement is 926.

Eight more of the 60 wounded German seamen were landed last night. The four most seriously injured were taken to Pasteur hospital. Two others had been put ashore shortly after the battered warship crept into sanctuary Wednesday night, the Achilles and Ajax at her heels.

Two Legless Men
Pasteur hospital said both legs of one of the men received last night would have to be amputated. One of the others already was legless. A third had had an arm amputated and the fourth was in agony from burns. The remainder of the eight went to another hospital.

Sixty-two British seamen taken from nine merchantmen during the Admiral Graf Spee's weeks of raiding were surrendered last night. They related the ordeal of waiting in cells below decks, counting and cheering each British hit on their floating prison, realizing at the same time that they were doomed if the battleship went down. Their prison was directly under one of the Admiral Graf Spee's 11-inch turrets.

An officer of the British steamer Doric Star, taken prisoner when his ship was sunk December 4 off the African coast, told how the cannonading awakened the prisoners early Wednesday.

"We knew what that sound meant," he said, "and we knew it was serious when the guards of our quarters looked and barred the doors and left to go to their battle stations."

Victory Meant Death
"As the battle progressed most of us realized that a British victory might mean our deaths, but nevertheless there was singing and cheering for the attackers."

"Although we counted 17 hits by British shells on the Graf Spee in various encounters that day."

"Probably you won't believe this, but several men who were shaving when the cannonading began went on and finished the job."

The officer said he was gawling for a sore throat when a shell fragment ripped into the prisoners' quarters. No one was hit, he said, "but I swallowed all the medicine."

The recoil from the Admiral Graf Spee's crashing guns shook the ship.
