ROADSIDE TREES ATTRACT TOURISTS

Seattle, Dec. 18-(AP)-Cutting of timber along the Pacific northwest's highways "is like killing the goose that lays the golden egg," Frank A. Kittredge of San Francisco, regional director of the national park service, said here.

Preservation of remaining stands of virgin timber bordering the highways is necessary if the Pacific northwest wants its tourist trade to keep coming, he said.

"It seems obvious," he said, "that the northwestern states could make no mistake if they decide certain timber areas which could not be touched for the present."

"There is no question but that the virgin timber stands in Oregon and Washington are a part of the lure which brings many thousands of tourists to the northwest each year."
