income taxes. For example, the
president would like to raise a
half-billion dollars by a special
levy. The individual and corporate
income tax total would be the
base and if the treasury
estimates that revenue from this
source is around 2.5 billion
dollars, a tax of 20 percent
would raise the \$500,000,000
desired.

Thus an individual whose in-
come tax is \$10 would be taxed
\$2 additional for the national
defense program; \$4 extra on a
\$20 income tax, and so forth,
into the upper brackets where
corporations would be paying
large money.

This plan, if adopted, as ap-
pears probable at this time,
hits only those who have a tax-
able income and permits to es-
cape several million individuals
whose exemptions and deduc-
tions enable them to avoid pay-
ing any income tax. The idea of
taxing the tax has certain ad-
vantages; among others it sim-
plifies calculation and collec-
tion.

If you are in civil service and are
a musician after hours, you cannot
march with a band in a political pa-
rade. Profane is a political and
not a moral issue, consequently a
civil service employe must not dis-
tribute literature denouncing the
Demon Rum, although it is proper
for the c.a.s. to be a member of a
temperance society.

Twenty-five pages of regulations
have just been issued by the Civil
Service Commission to inform gov-
ernment workers how to observe the
Hatch Act. These regulations do not
apply to everyone on the federal pay-
roll, however, as there are several
hundred thousand holding jobs in
"emergency" agencies which have
not yet been blanketed into civil
service.

A civil service employe can at-
tend a political convention as an
observer but cannot participate. He
can make a voluntary contribution
to a party but not to a candidate
and he can receive a letter at home
saying him to buy tickets to a Jack-
son dinner, although such a letter
addressed to his office is an offense.
Nor can a civil service employe take
a leave of absence and devote that
period to political activity. On the
other hand, "two cases" wear a cam-
paign button, but is forbidden to hand out
buttons, badges or pamphlets. An
interesting prohibition is one in-
tended to prevent anyone in the
classified service from making an
election bet.

Those believing that their civil lib-
erties are being hampered by the
regulations have the privilege of re-
signing and then marching in polit-
ical parades, being officers of polit-
ical organizations, wearing their
bottom dollar and ringing doorbells
in behalf of a candidate. The com-
mission will see that every civil ser-
vice employe is furnished with a copy
of the 25 pages before the 1940 cam-
paign.
