### COTTON GINNERS GAVE ASSOCIATED FARMERS COIN AND AID IS WORD

San Francisco, Dec. 21.—(P)—Cotton ginner contributed thousands of dollars, solicited members to act as collection agents for the Associated Farmers of California, the LaFollette Senate Civil Liberties committee was told today.

Fred Goodcell, former secretary of the Associated Farmers of California, said ginning companies had contributed \$7,431 to the organization in the past three years and solicited members from among the growers who delivered cotton to them.

A letter from the secretary of the Producers Cotton Oil company of Fresno to the Associated Farmers of Kern county was read, offering to distribute literature and application blanks to farmers under Associated Farmer letterheads.

"Our feeling," the letter said, "is that it might be advisable not to let the name of this company enter into the letter in anyway so that the association retain the proper designation as the 'Farmers' organization."

The letter was not signed but was identified by Harry S. Baker of Fresno, president of the company.

### Menus of the Day

By Mrs. Alexander George, Cookies With An Appeal Dinner For Three Hot Clam Broth (Canned) Noodleburger Buttered Spinach Bread Currant Jam Fruit Slaw

3 tablespoons fat 3 tablespoons chopped onions 1/2 cup diced celery 2 tablespoons minced parsley 1/2 pound hamburger 3 tablespoons flour 2 cups tomatoes 2 cups cooked noodles 2/3 teaspoon salt 1/3 teaspoon paprika Heat the fat in a frying pan. Add and let simmer for five minutes the onions, celery, parsley and hamburger. Mix in the flour and add the rest of the ingredients. Cook slowly for 10 minutes. Stir often.

Fruit Slaw 2 cups shredded cabbage 1/2 cup sliced apricots 1/2 cup sliced oranges 1/2 teaspoon salt 1/4 teaspoon celery seed 1/3 cup salad dressing Chill the ingredients. Combine and serve in a bowl.

Chocolate-Chip Cookies 1/2 cup fat 1/2 cup dark brown sugar 1/2 cup granulated sugar 2 eggs, beaten 2 tablespoons cream 1 teaspoon vanilla 1/4 teaspoon salt 1/4 cup shaved sweet chocolate 1/2 cup shaved nuts 2 1/2 cups pastry flour 1 teaspoon soda Cream the fat and sugars. Add the eggs and cream. Mix in the rest of the ingredients and chill the dough. Drop portions from the tip of a spoon onto greased baking sheets. Flatten each cookie with the back of a spoon which has been dipped in flour—or with the broad side of a knife. Bake.
