Small Fleet Is Hard Put to Cover Whole West Coast—Activity Is Intense.

With the Royal Canadian Army on the West Coast—(U.P.)—Canada's west coast is the scene of intense naval activity designed to block off German submarines and to protect shipping from sea raiders.
Hampered by lack of ships, the Canadian navy has been making up for its small numbers by ceaseless activity.
Destroyers Churn
Up and down Canada's Pacific coast churn destroyers, arch enemies of the submarine. Stubby mine-sweepers patrol the channels outside the harbors, making sure no enemy mines have been laid. Inspection boats lie outside the harbors night and day, examining all vessels entering port. In and out of the countless inlets and bays that might furnish haven to submarines or raiders move tiny fishing craft, now mounting guns and flying the white ensign.
Canada's navy is young, but in the traditions of the British navy it is old, and in these traditions carrying on, carrying on in a relentless guard against the unseen enemy.

In High Gear
Esquimalt, west coast naval base, went into high gear when war was declared, and has increased its tempo of activity since then. On shore, naval artificers hammer and forge and cut and weld, preparing articles needed for the ships at sea, and for those preparing to put out. Protecting the harbor itself is an anti-submarine net, drawn completely across the harbor mouth each night. On the surface are visible only large metal floats, resembling garbage cans.
