OREGONIANS HALT LOSING STREAK IN EASTERN INVASION

Final Game of Barnstorming Tour Marked by Heavy Scoring of Dick, Anderson

Moline, Ill., Dec. 28.—(P)—The Oregon university quintet had little trouble scoring a 57-22 victory over Augustana college of Rock Island last night. Leading 18-10 at the half, the visitors put on the pressure in the second session. Dick and Anderson, with 11 points each, were high scorers for Oregon.

The victory broke the four-game losing streak for the defending national collegiate champions from the west coast. It also marked the end of their barnstorming tour.

Oregon scored at will in the second half.

Ex-Coach Criticizes Aid to Mentally Limited Athletes

New York, Dec. 28.—(P)—Prof. L. C. Boles of Wooster (Ohio) college today recommended that "at the risk of being classed as a reformer," the college physical education association "should stand firmly against the tendency of using our physical education department as a field for men of very little mental capacity to matriculate and continue in college for the purpose of playing on the varsity teams."

Prof. Boles spoke as president of the association in opening its annual meeting. He also spoke from a background of 33 years of football coaching, the last 25 at Wooster, where he resigned at the end of the 1939 season to take over the position of director of athletics.

"Learning the important skills of our varsity games," he said, "should not be accepted as the grand total of a college education. We should not have one course set up so that one with such a limited mental capacity could continue as a college student."

"Recently I went through the catalogue of a college in the middle-west of some 1,500 students, in which the physical education department offered a total of 85 term-hour credits in that department alone. With a staff of four or five men carrying on a non-credit intercollegiate and intramural program, it seems to be entirely impossible to give worthwhile work to the extent."

ZIVIC KNOCKED OUT BY ARON IN EIGHTH

Chicago, Dec. 28. (P)—Fritzie Zivic may not know what it is to be shorn of the welterweight title, but the Pittsburgh battler probably had a good idea today as he found himself stripped of the closest thing to it—the rating of No. 1 challenger to Champion Henry Armstrong.

Milton Aron, son of a Chicago rabbi, and a deadly puncher, accounted for Zivic's sad younglings by knocking out the youngest of a family of fighters last night in the eighth round of a scheduled 10-round bout.

Trojans Register Fifth Win in Row

Philadelphia, Dec. 28.—(P)—Southern California's basketball squad registered their fifth consecutive victory by defeating Temple university 46-30 last night. The visitors overcame an early lead to go out in front at the half 23-15. Keith Lambert, the Trojans' scoring ace, was injured in the second half and was believed to have suffered a sprained ankle.

BEAVER QUINTET TRIMS MICHIGAN IN SEE-SAW TILT

Staters Pull Out Ahead in Final Minutes of Fast-Scoring Casaba Contest.

Astoria, Ore., Dec. 28.—(P)—Oregon State college pulled away in the final minutes of play to defeat the Michigan state basketball team 38-33 in a see-saw game here last night.

Two thousand excited fans saw the lead change hands 14 times. During the first eight minutes of the second half the lead shifted six times, with Michigan State emerging from a two minute scoring spree with a 25-24 lead.

The Oregon State goal turned toward victory when Paul Valenti fired a long shot to put the Beavers ahead 30-29. Oregon State remained out in front after that.

Race Horse Scoring

Led by Bobby Morris, the Spartans came back strong early in the second half to head the Beavers, 29 to 24. Twelve points were scored by the teams in a little more than two minutes of "race horse" basketball.

Each team scored 14 field goals but Oregon State benefited from free throws.
