

ROOSEVELT WILL APPOINT BELL AS TREASURER'S AIDE

Nominations For Supreme Court and Diplomatic Corps Also Planned Soon.

Washington, Dec. 29.—(P)—President Roosevelt announced today that he would name Daniel W. Bell, former acting budget director, to the vacant post of undersecretary of the treasury.

At a press conference Mr. Roosevelt said he would submit the nomination to the senate when congress assembles.

Bell now is an assistant to the secretary of the treasury.

The president disclosed also that a few days after congress meets Jan. 3 he would send up nominations to fill the vacancy on the supreme court and positions in the diplomatic corps. Five diplomatic posts are vacant.

The names of Attorney General Murphy and John D. Wickhem of the Wisconsin supreme court have figured prominently in capitol speculation over a successor to the late Justice Pierce Butler. Both are mid-westerners and Catholics, as was Butler.

The prospective new treasury undersecretary is a native of Kinderhook, Ill. Now 48 years old, he joined the treasury when he was 20 as a civil service clerical appointee in the office of the United States treasury.

Bell was acting budget director until last April, when the president gave the post to Harold D. Smith.

STAGE DRIVERS ON STRIKE VERGE

Portland, Ore., Dec. 29.—(P)—A strike of drivers, mechanics and helpers of the Oregon motor stages will be called at 1 a. m. Saturday unless wage demands are met or the controversy is submitted to arbitration.

The company operates stages in Salem and Eugene and to various points from Portland. Wage increases of 1 1/2 mills per highway mile for "outside drivers" and 12 1/2 cents an hour for employes working inside cities are sought.

WOULD RELIEVE FINNS OF WAR DEBT PAYING

Washington, Dec. 29.—(P)—Rep. Smith (D., Wash.) announced today he would introduce on the opening day of congress next week a bill to relieve Finland from making further payments at this time on her debt to the United States and to loan her the amounts she already has paid.

Finland borrowed \$8,281,926 and has paid \$5,056,588. Her debt, with interest figured, now stands at \$8,142,990. (Her regular semi-annual payments have been practically all interest.)

JAPAN'S CABINET NOT PLANNING RESIGNATION

Tokyo, Dec. 29.—(P)—Premier Gen. Nobuyuki Abe, in an interview in Japanese newspapers today, declared the cabinet had no intention of resigning, despite a resolution presented yesterday by a majority of the house of representatives unofficially suggesting the cabinet "consider" such a step.

Abe said the government was concerned solely with disposition of the war in China and readjustment of foreign relations, and could not be troubled by "maneuvers of professional politicians."

HUSBAND HELD IN LIQUOR TRAGEDY

Ontario, Ore., Dec. 29.—(P)—Coroner R. A. Racke said an autopsy would be held today in the death of Mrs. Clara Thomas, 55, found dead yesterday on the kitchen floor of her home. Sheriff C. W. Glenn said her husband, John C. Thomas, was lying alongside her in a liquor-induced stupor. He was held pending an inquest.

A laboratory test, Racke said, revealed enough alcohol in Mrs. Thomas' stomach and blood stream to cause death. There were no external marks on her body.

America Too Icy

TRIO RETURNED FOR GRAND JURY HEARING ON CHECK CHARGES

Theodore J. Morris, 31, Paul Swearinger, 28, and Edgar Epperson, 19, transients charged with passing of spurious checks in this city, Talent and northern California points, were returned late yesterday from Gooding, Idaho where they were arrested for local authorities.

Besides the check operations, they are also charged with defrauding an innkeeper. They departed owing Camp Withus \$40 for cabin rent, it is claimed. In justice court this morning the three waived preliminary hearing and were ordered held to await action of the grand jury.

According to the sheriff's office, the defendants during their stay in this city and vicinity passed more than \$200 in spurious checks. They also passed bogus paper at Dunsuir, Calif., and Burns, Ore., it is asserted. Deputy Sheriff William Grenbemer returned the men here, and during the trip encountered deep snow on the roads.
