POST-CHRISTMAS DIP IN RETAIL BUSINESS LIGHTER THIS YEAR

New York, Dec. 29.—(AP)—The usual post-Christmas decline in retail buying was cushioned this week by active and unexpected demand for heavy apparel, Dun & Bradstreet said today in a weekly survey.

Despite the drop from the preceding week, retail distribution outstripped the similar 1938 week by 2 to 6 percent for the country as a whole, the agency estimated.

The cold wave that swept out of the west to the Atlantic seaboard sent consumers scurrying for long deferred heavy clothing needs.

"Winter wearing apparel moved out at the fastest rate this month in most of the leading centers of distribution."

"Demand was especially strong for trimmed and untrimmed coats, fur garments, overcoats, men's suits, and children's clothing."

"Few store-wide clearances were in progress . . . on many offerings mark-downs were small, as holdings were light."

SNOWCAST

for the Shasta Cascade Wonderland



The following news on snow, road and weather conditions at sports areas in the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland is prepared by the U. S. Soil Conservation Service.

Diamond Lake: Radio report this morning at 7:30 indicates cloudy skies, with wind southwest strong. Temperature 39, minimum past 24 hours, 35 degrees. Snow depth only 2 inches. No new snow during the past week. Ice on lake breaking up.

Crater Lake: Snow dept at Park Headquarters at 8 a.m. 34 inches, compared with 48 inches December 30, last year; 4 1/2 inches new snow fell during past week. Snow described as wet heavy. Temperature 33; range past 24 hours, 33 to 31 degrees. Foggy; wind southwest light.

South and West Entrance roads, as well as road from Park Headquarters to Rim open but slushy; chains advised. Highway 62 from Fort Klamath to South Entrance in good condition. There are the usual parking areas, warming and rest room facilities at Park Headquarters, Annie Spring and Rim. Meals and short orders may be obtained at Park Headquarters, but overnight accommodations for the week-end are all reserved.

Union Creek: 8 a.m. temperature 34 degrees. No snow in this area. Highway in good condition, being dry. Carry chains for use at high elevations. Skies pasty cloudy and no wind.

Lake of the Woods: Snow depth 2 inches. Roars to the lake very muddy; chains advised. Travel to lake would be better when ground again freezes. Temperature 38; range past 24 hours, 42 to 36 degrees. Skies cloudy; no wind. Lake is frozen on edge only and not safe for skating.

Siskiyou Summit: 8 a.m. temperature 38; maximum past 24 hours 38, minimum 31. Foggy with occasional showers; wind southwest 12 miles. Highway clear, but chains should be carried. Patches of snow only at the summit.

Trail Camp—Mt. Ashland: Road from Ashland to Trail camp in good condition; chains not needed. No snow. Skies cloudy; wind south strong; temperature 52 degrees.

Mount Shasta—Sierra Alpine Lodge: The Everett memorial highway to Sierra Alpine Lodge passable nearly to Sand Flat, but chains should be carried. Snow depth at the Alpine Lodge 54 inches, described as 48 inches normal pack topped with 6 inches powder which fell December 28. Mt. Shasta City temperature 46; range past 24 hours, 46 to 40. Skies cloudy, occasional rain; wind southeast 10 miles.

Snowman's Hill: No snow.

Mount Lassen Sports Areas: Snow at Sulphur Works Checking Station in the Lassen Volcanic National Park is reported this morning as in patches only. One inch fell December 28, followed by rain. Road to Jones point 3 miles above Sulphur Works will be open this week-end. Snow depth there 18 inches, described as soft wet. Chains advised. Skies clearing at Mineral, but foggy with light rain at Sulphur Works. No wind. Temperature 46; range past 24 hours 42 to 36.

Manzanita Lake: No snow at this area. Road in good condition but chains advised. No skating on Manzanita Lake.

Mineral: In the Lassen National Forest reports no snow.
