SALVATION ARMY GOES INTO 'RED' IN YULE WORK

The Salvation Army went \$9.60 in the hole on its Christmas charities this year despite a larger income, it was shown by statistics given out today by Capt. Reginald H. Vincent, Medford district commander. Cash receipts this year totaled \$406.99, Captain Vincent said. This sum included \$283.12 deposited in the Salvation Army kettles, \$75 received from the Eagles lodge and \$48.87 received in the mail. This year's cash receipts exceeded last year's by \$175, the Eagles' contribution of \$75 being included in the increase. In addition to the cash, the Salvation Army received contributions of food, toys and other merchandise of an estimated value of \$228.50, about \$20 more than last year, Captain Vincent said. A greater amount of charitable work was done this Christmas than last and when all ex-

penses were calculated it was found that income was \$9.60 shy of making both ends meet, the captain stated. He said that the deficit would be made up out of the Salvation Army's general fund but indicated he would not decline a contribution from some generous person who could afford to wipe out the \$9.60 "loss." This year the Salvation Army distributed Christmas baskets to 148 families as compared with 82 last year. Of the increase 53 were accounted for by the Eagles who this year turned over its list of needy families to the Salvation Army and contributed \$50 cash to pay for the additional baskets. The Eagles also contributed \$25 for toys, Medford post of the American Legion also granting a credit of \$25 for toys. Hundreds of poor children attended the Christmas party at the Salvation Army auditorium last Tuesday night. Other Christmas charities were carried out by the Salvation Army this year.

VETERANS BONUS EXPIRES TUESDAY

Carol J. Parker, commander of Jackson county chapter of the Disabled American Veterans of the World War, today reminded all ex-service men and women that the time for filing original applications for adjusted compensation expires next Tuesday, January 2. All veterans who desire to obtain the benefits of adjusted compensation and have not applied should make application immediately, Mr. Parker emphasized. An official notice states that all applications or letters relating thereto received in the Veterans Administration, Washington, D. C., or its regional offices or facilities throughout the country, if stamped as received in such offices on or before January 2, will be accepted as received on that date.

Veterans may procure detailed information about the filing of applications from veteran organizations or the Veterans Administration and its adjuncts.

Menus of the Day

- By Mrs. Alexander George When the Crowd Gathers Informal Refreshments (Enough for Eight)
- Spiced Cider Punch
 - Molasses Snaps
 - Cherry Cookies
 - Apples
 - Grapes
 - Salted Peanuts
 - Spiced Elder Punch
 - 6 cups hot tea (strained)
 - 1 1/2 gallons cider
 - 3 cups dark brown sugar
 - 2/3 cup lemon juice
 - 1 cup orange juice
 - 1 1/3 teaspoons salt
 - 1/3 cup bark cinnamon
 - 2 tablespoons whole cloves
 - Cover and let the ingredients simmer together for 10 minutes. Strain. Reheat and serve.
- Molasses Snaps
- 2/3 cup fat
 - 1 1/2 cups dark brown sugar
 - 2/3 cup molasses
 - 1 teaspoon cinnamon
 - 1 teaspoon ginger

- 1/4 teaspoon cloves
 - 1/4 teaspoon salt
 - 5 cups flour
 - 1 1/2 teaspoons soda
 - 1 teaspoon baking powder
 - Cream the fat and sugar. Add the molasses and spices. Beat well. Add the rest of the ingredients. Chill the dough and then roll it out on a floured board and cut out cookies. Bake 10 minutes in a moderate oven.
- Cherry Cookies
- 2/3 cup butter
 - 1 1/2 cups granulated sugar
 - 2 eggs, beaten
 - 1/4 cup red cherry juice

- 1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
 - 1/3 teaspoon grated orange rind
 - 1/3 teaspoon salt
 - 4 cups flour
 - 3 teaspoons baking powder
 - Sliced red cherries
 - Cream the butter and sugar. Add the eggs and juice. Mix well. Blend in the rinds, salt, flour and baking powder. Chill the dough. Drop portions of the dough from the tip of a spoon onto greased baking sheets. Flatten each cookie and top with cherry slice. Bake.
