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TREND POINTS TO TIGHTER CHECK ON STATE'S DRINKING

Sprague Is Eyeing Business Closely, Events Show—'Clubs' Being Scrutinized.

By Victor Dallaire, U. P. Staff Correspondent. Salem.—(U.P.)—Dark days lie ahead for the Oregon imbiber if present auguries be true. Under the watchful eye of Gov. Charles A. Sprague, a stricter enforcement of the liquor laws, a gradual rise in prices at the state-owned stores and a tightening up of qualifications for retail beer and wine licenses are coming into being.

The governor is notably dry in spirit—he does not accept liquor advertising in his newspaper, the Salem Statesman—and observers hint he would like to see Oregon back on the dry roll.

Stricter Enforcement. Latest in a long string of occurrences that point to a future semi-arid condition in Oregon was the replacement of Walter Winters, chief of liquor enforcement activities since May, 1937, by Capt. Clyde Warren of the Oregon state police. The change came immediately after a "social" meeting between the liquor administrator, J. J. Hague, and the governor, an almost certain forerunner of changes in the liquor setup.

Warren was appointed to bring about stricter enforcement of the Knox liquor law, which controls the sale of alcoholic beverages in the state, although small complaint of the enforcement was heard from other than the die-hard faction. "Clubs" Sore Spot.

Sorest spot with the dry faction is the so-called private club where members bring their own liquor to have it served back to them over the bar. The problem of their regulation is purely a local one and local authorities haven't been so keen at keeping them under control as the administration wishes.

The administration has leveled its guns at the private bars by mustering ministerial aid. Shortly after an earlier "social" chat between the governor and Hague, Hague rounded up the ministers of Salem and presented the private club problem to them, with particular emphasis on one that had been operating near Salem for a long time and which, apparently, abided by the laws but still drew the fire of the capitalist's darts. The campaign is to be carried out in all towns of the state.

In another move, the state will soon launch an educational campaign to warn youth of the dangers of drinking to combat the advertising of the liquor companies—although most manufacturers, aware of a reactionary dry wave, have been urging moderation in drinking habits.

Wets Satisfied Now. Action on the licensed tavern front is expected as a result of a conference between Hague's commission and the state department of agriculture, which does the sanitary inspection of the beer dispensaries. An announcement by the commission said that all taverns and package stores that have a savory reputation for the past will have their permits. A poor sanitary report could be used to deny a renewal of a license.

Most wets are satisfied with the present state-controlled liquor system, but some complaint was heard when a substantial jump in prices was ordered last spring. If higher prices come that are not justified by economic conditions the gentle murmur of complaint may mount to a definite roar.
