

PRESBYTERIANS WILL DEDICATE CHURCH AT BANDON ON SUNDAY

Dr. Sherman L. Divine, pastor of the Presbyterian church here, today announced that dedication of the new Presbyterian church and manse in Bandon had been scheduled for Sunday. All day services under the leadership of the Rev. Elmer Rosenkyde, new church pastor, will observe the dedication of the \$5,000 church and the \$2,500 manse which replace the ones destroyed during the tragic Bandon fire of 1938. Construction of the new buildings was brought about by the efforts of a special commission of the South West Presby-

tery of which Dr. Divine was the chairman. The commission had the cooperation of the Board of the National Missions of New York City. The Rev. Rosenkyde was formerly pastor of the Merlin church. Prior to the re-building of the church and manse, services were make-shift, having been conducted in whatever buildings were available at the moment.

JAIL POPULATION AT LOW WINTER LEVEL

The county jail today contained but nine inmates, a small number for the dead of winter, and the lowest bastille population in some time. All now interned are county prisoners, either serving sentences or awaiting sentence. Federal prisoners held in the county jail have either served their time or been moved to other jails.

NAZIS AWAIT SPRING TO LAUNCH ATTACKS SAYS LORD LOTHIAN

Chicago, Jan. 5.—(P)—Germany probably will launch a "terrific" attack against England and France by land, sea and air this spring, Lord Lothian, British ambassador to the United States, told the Chicago council on foreign relations last night. "If and when the attack comes," he added, "it will be with all the ferocity and ruthlessness the Nazis have taught us to expect." The ambassador expressed the belief that the anticipated attack would be repelled and if repelled as decisively as was the big German offensive of 1918 "it will not be long before Hitlerism itself goes down to defeat." Lord Lothian termed mastery of the seas "the real key to victory" and asserted Germany would be "on top of the world" if she compelled Great Britain and France to surrender their fleets and naval bases.

AUTOISTS WARNED TO GET LICENSE

Automobile owners were specifically counseled by state police today that all who do not display 1940 plates or temporary stickers are subject to arrest. Persons who have not yet procured 1940 plates may make application at the sheriff's office here or the city police station in Ashland and receive a temporary sticker that will serve in lieu of the plates until they are received from Salem, it was pointed out. License plate applications are not received by state or city police headquarters in Medford. The state police reported excellent cooperation on the part of motorists in procuring their plates early and directly from Salem and in displaying them promptly.

SNOWCAST for the Shasta Cascade Wonderland

The following report on snow, road and weather conditions at sports areas in the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland is prepared by the U. S. soil conservation service:

Diamond lake: Snow depth only 4 inches, all new since yesterday. Snow described as soft medium. Temperature 25, range past 24 hours, 34 to 23 degrees. Light south wind blowing, snow falling. The lake is entirely open.

Crater lake: Snow depth at park headquarters at 8 a. m., 45 inches, including 21 inches medium dry snow which fell from Monday to Friday of this week. Snow described as normal packed, topped with 15 inches medium dry. Temperature 19; range past 24 hours, 19 to 29 degrees. Wind southeast, light; snowing.

South and west entrance roads, as well as road from park headquarters to rim, covered with thin layer of snow and ice; chains needed. Highway 62 from Fort Klamath to the south entrance open. There are the usual parking areas, warming and rest room facilities at park headquarters, Annie Spring and the rim. Meals and short orders may be obtained at park headquarters, as well as overnight accommodations. It is necessary, however, for guests to furnish their own bedding.

Union Creek: 8 a. m. temperature 30 degrees. Highway in good condition to Union Creek but chains needed. Total snow depth 3 inches of soft medium which fell last night. Calm and cloudy but not snowing.

Lake of the Woods: Snow depth 3 inches. Most of this fell since Wednesday. Temperature 28, range past 24 hours, 38 to 28 degrees. Skies cloudy with occasional light snow; wind southwest 5 miles. Lake not frozen and no skating available. All roads into lake are considered passable when frozen, although badly rutted; chains advised.

Siskiyou summit: One inch of snow on the ground; one-half inch soft snow fell last night; temperature 29; range past 24 hours, 38 to 28 degrees. Cloudy with occasional light snow; wind south 3 miles. Highway open but slippery in spots; chains should be carried.

Trail Camp-Mt. Ashland: Road from Ashland to Trail camp in good condition. Covered with snow last 4 miles; chains essential last 2½ miles. Snow depth 11 inches, of which 10 inches is new. Snow is described as normal pack; partly cloudy, no wind, temperature 27. Brush on ski run not entirely covered by snow.

Mount Shasta-Sierra Alpine Lodge: Everett Memorial highway to Sierra Alpine Lodge is closed. McCloud Avenue road open 5 miles to snow line; carry chains. Snow depth at the Alpine lodge 60 inches, 50 inches normal pack topped with 10 inches soft powder; 10 inches new snow fell during the past two days. Mt. Shasta City temperature 28; range past 24 hours 50 to 28 degrees. Sky overcast; wind northwest 1 mile.

Snowman's Hill: Four inches of snow has fallen during the past two days, but is insufficient for skiing.

Mount Lassen sports areas: Snow depth at Sulphur Works checking station in the Lassen Volcanic national park 24 inches, including 4 inches powder; snow is light crust topped with 4 inches powder. Road in good shape for two-way travel; chains advised. Temperature 22; range past 24 hours, 32 to 24 degrees. Clear and calm this morning.

Manzanita lake: Snow depth 3 inches, which fell last night; described as soft powder. Road open for two-way travel; chains advised. No skating on Manzanita lake. Temperature 30; range past 24 hours, 40 to 28 degrees. Partly cloudy, wind south light.

Mineral: In Lassen national forest, reports highway open for two-way traffic, some snow on road, chains advised. Total snow depth 3 inches, which fell this morning and is described as soft wet. Temperature 28, maximum past 24 hours 40 degrees. Cloudy, wind north light.
