QUILT PATTERN TO MARK FARM OF TOMORROW

Springfield, Tenn. (AP)—Motocross country through Robertson county often shake their heads and think that farmers there don't know much about farming—but they do.

There are more crooked rows in those fields than in any other section of the United States. Many of the farms have taken on semblances of quilt patterns, and from the air they look like coats of many colors, stitched at the seams by sinuous terraces.

But while they appear most unorthodox, these farms are the farms of tomorrow. The men who till the soil on them can plow a straight furrow, but they have learned that the day of the straight row has passed. Contour rows are far superior. Not only do they help conserve the soil, but they make the land more productive.

A new fashion for rows, small grains, pastures and legumes has been introduced here by engineers and farm planners who are directing operations on a conservation demonstration project covering 30,000 acres. The project is being sponsored by the U. S. department of agriculture, which established a special area here two years ago.

NEW SPEED MARKS FEATURE RECORDS SET IN PAST YEAR Old Standards Exceeded in 1939 By Latest Models Of Planes, Autos, Boats.

Washington, D. C.—(Sp.)—A pilot flew 575 miles per hour, an automobile driver sped more than 388 miles per hour, two aviators soared in a seaplane for 30 days and a motorboat was driven 141 miles per hour.

These are among the records for 1939 listed in a bulletin from the National Geographic society. "At Buffalo, N. Y., H. Lloyd Childs dived at the rate of 575 miles an hour while demonstrating a Curtiss speed airplane to French army officials. For straight flying, however, a new record was made by a German flier, Fritz Wendell. He flew 469.11 miles per hour, six miles better than the former record," the bulletin says.

Paris to London. "Francisco Sarabia, foremost Mexican aviator, made a record flight from Mexico, D. F., to New York, 2,359 miles, in 10 hours and 48 minutes. A new U. S. transcontinental flight record was set by a 'flying fortress' of 22 tons when, in August, a bomber flew from Burbank, Cal., to New York, 2,500 miles, in 9 hours, 14 1/2 minutes.

"Alex Henshaw of England broke the round-trip airplane record from England to Cape Town, flying the 13,000-mile route in 4 days, 10 hours and 16 minutes and cutting 31 hours from the previous record. Paris and London are only 41 minutes apart by air since the new record made in January by a plane of the royal air force.

"The women's light plane speed record was broken by Jacqueline Cochran in July when she flew over a Long Island course at a speed of 173.097 miles per hour. This bettered the former record, made by the same aviatrix, by about 10 miles per hour.

"The new air endurance record set in 1939 was made by Wes Carroll and Clyde Schlieper, near Long Beach, Cal., on October 30. In the air 726 hours, they broke the former record by 73 hours.

"Clipper ship records fell too in 1939. The American Clipper of Pan American Airways flew from Southampton, England, to New York by the northern route in 29 hours and 53 minutes. The Yankee Clipper set a new flight record between the Azores and New York; it flew the route in 17 1/2 hours, or 29 minutes under the previous record.

"Imperial Airways set a new record for the Ireland to Newfoundland jump when the 'Cabot' made the flight in 13,005 hours, one-half hour under the previous record.

"On the Bonneville salt flats, Utah, in August, John R. Cobb, London fur broker, sped 368.85 miles an hour, about 10 miles faster than the former record held by another Englishman, Capt. George E. T. Eyston. Sir Malcolm Campbell, former holder of automobile speed records, in 1939 shattered the speed record on water by driving his craft 141.74 miles an hour. The former record was 130.9 miles, set by the same pilot.

"A streamline German train, operating between Berlin and Hamburg, set a new world's record for railroad speed when it ran at 134 miles an hour."

P. O. Receipts Up Hood River, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Hood River's 1939 postal receipts established an all-time record of \$36,952. The year's business four decades ago was but \$2700.
