GARDNER CLOSES LURID CAREER BY SUICIDE IN HOTEL

her present home in Napa. Spectacular Escapes Now Mrs. Dollie Parks, wife of a state hospital employe, she said she planned to come here today to claim the body for burial. Gardner, who was sentenced to 25 years imprisonment at McNeil island, Wash., for the San Diego robbery, escaped from the train enroute there near Portland, Ore. He was recaptured in Roseville, Calif., May 23, 1921 and in the interim he robbed a mail train of \$117,000 in securities. He told the federal judge who sentenced him to McNeil for 30 years that he would escape again, and he did enroute to the prison, this time near Castle Rock, Wash. Recaptured at Centralia, Wash., and finally placed on the Puget Sound island, he bolted from it in a sensational break September 5, 1921, while one companion was slain by guards and another wounded. In November, 1921 he tried to rob a mail train in Phoenix, Ariz., but Herman Interled, the clerk, overpowered him.

BEAUTICIAN PUPIL SUES SCHOOL FOR TUITION, EXPENSE

Suit for \$355.20 was filed yesterday by Bessie Moyers against Monte Leonard and Lura Lynch, doing business as the Leonard Beauty college. The plaintiff alleges she made arrangements to take a course at the Leonard Beauty college last September with the understanding she would be given credit for 925 hours served as a student at the Stevenson College of Beauty in Sacramento. The Leonard course, it is set forth, requires 1,500 hours, with a tuition of \$105 for the full course. It was agreed, the complaint says, the tuition after deducting the California school time, would be \$35, to be completed in three months. She paid \$25, leaving a balance of \$10. The plaintiff asserts that last December 28 Leonard advised her the deduction would not be made and that she would have to take the full 1,500-hour course before she could obtain a license to practice in Oregon. The plaintiff asks for expenses, money assertedly lost from employment, while taking the beauty course, and return of tuition. Attorney Charles Reames appears as counsel for plaintiff.

The suit was filed yesterday. Attorneys George M. Roberts and William N. McAllister appear as counsel for the plaintiffs. The complaint sets forth the disconnection would relieve the Hueners from city taxes, liens and assessments, with the exception of bonded indebtedness incurred before the filing of the suit. The land involved is 160 acres more or less and lies on the boundary lines of the city, with no sidewalks or other city improvements. The land has been within the city limits of Jacksonville for more than 30 years, it is explained.
