

# JACKSON'S SHARE IN VEHICLE FEES TOTALS \$87,844

Gas Tax, Registration, Truck Fees and Fines Bring Oregon \$14,233,609 in 1939

Salem, Jan. 11.—(AP)—Oregon motor vehicle fund receipts during 1939 totaled \$14,233,609, including \$10,271,167 from gasoline tax, \$2,959,687 from motor vehicle registration fees, \$979,116 from motor carrier fees and \$23,657 from fines. Secretary of State Earl Snell said today.

A total of \$2,234,676 was distributed to counties, the remainder being used by the highway commission for construction and maintenance of roads and for payment of principal and interest on bonds.

Multnomah county received the largest share, \$687,482, followed by Marion \$166,385, Lane \$137,734, Clackamas \$106,737, Klamath \$93,366, Jackson \$87,844, Washington \$79,568, Coos \$66,939, Linn \$65,390, Umatilla \$59,696, Yamhill \$57,028, Douglas \$53,080, Clatsop \$45,284, Benton \$40,205, Columbia \$39,848, Malheur \$38,662, Deschutes \$38,588, Union \$37,783, Josephine \$36,282, Baker \$34,499, Polk \$33,448, Wasco \$30,878, Hood River \$27,145, Tillamook \$26,518, Lincoln \$24,938, Willows \$14,395, Lake \$14,129, Grant \$13,840, Harney \$11,467, Morrow \$9,745, Crook \$9,421, Curry \$8,552, Gilliam \$7,230, Sherman \$6,738, Wheeler \$5,828, and Jefferson \$4,168.

# NAZIS REPULSE FRENCH ATTACK

Berlin, Jan. 11.—(AP)—A French company in a surprise attack was reported by the German official news agency today to have succeeded in breaking the German line in Kreuzberg, east of Forbach, only to be driven back later by a Nazi counterattack.

The sector is on the western front a short distance from Saarbruecken. The official news agency, DNB, said the French left dead and wounded when they were driven back by local German outposts after a short-lived triumph.

It also said that a few French prisoners were taken by surprise German flank action.

# V. F. W. AUXILIARY OFFERS STUDENTS PRIZES ON ESSAYS

'Benefits of Democracy' is Topic for National Contest—\$1000 Is First Award

To stimulate appreciation of the privileges of being an American citizen, the Ladies' Auxiliary to the Veterans of Foreign Wars has announced that the subject of this year's nationwide essay contest, open to all accredited high school students in America, will be "The Benefits of Democracy."

The contest has received the full sanction of Medford school officials and a large number of local manuscripts are expected to be turned into Mrs. Florence Hall of 1011 East Eleventh street, president of the V.F.W. auxiliary here, and local contest chairman. The contest closes the midnight of February 22 and all local essays must be in Mrs. Hall's hands by that time.

**\$1000 First Prize**  
This year high school students will compete for a national first prize of \$1,000. Second prize will be \$500, third prize \$250 and fourth \$100. There will be 10 additional awards of \$10 and 10 more of \$5.

For Medford high school students, including freshmen, the local auxiliary will give \$5 for the best essay and \$2.50 for the second best. These will be judged by a committee of Daughters of the American Revolution members. Dean Frank L. Martin of the University of Missouri school of Journalism is chairman of the committee of judges for essays entered in the national contest.

**Rules Given**  
Rules of the contest state that manuscripts may be from 500 to 1,000 words and must be typed and double-spaced, with one original and two copies (two carbons acceptable) to be furnished. Pages must be fastened together with staples or brads and the contestant's name, age, mail address and name of school represented must be written in the upper right-hand corner of each page. Further details may be obtained from the local contest chairman.

The V.F.W. auxiliary has conducted a similar Americanism essay contest for the past four years, and last year received compositions from 25,000 high school students who competed for a top prize of \$200.

# STEPMOTHER IS SUED ON ATTACK

San Francisco, Jan. 11.—(AP) Mrs. Ralph Levee, wife of a Vallejo department store owner, today filed a \$250,000 damage suit against her husband's stepmother, charging slander and assault.

The suit filed in superior court accused Mrs. S. M. Levee of knocking the plaintiff unconscious at an encounter in the Mark Hopkins hotel dining room here on New Year's eve. The suit involves one of Vallejo's most wealthy and prominent families.

Mrs. Elsie Levee's complaint accused her stepmother-in-law, Mrs. Marie Levee, of "Assaulting the plaintiff by striking her on the head with a heavy object, knocking her unconscious, kicking her, placing a burning cigarette against her body and severely burning her body; insulting and slandering the plaintiff by calling her obscene names in the presence of a third person, said insults being false, defamatory and exposing the plaintiff to ridicule."
