GIRL ASSAULTERS GET LIFE TERMS Seattle, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Eugene Weaver, 19, and Raymond Pruch, 19, were convicted of first degree kidnaping yesterday for the abduction-attack of a 16-year-old Seattle school girl from her escort's automobile. The jury disregarded prosecution pleas for death sentences and recommended life imprisonment for each.

COURTS EASY ON GAME VIOLATORS CLAIM OF GEROW

Portland, Jan. 13.—(AP)—James Gerow, biological survey enforcement officer, censured the absence of cooperation in the Oregon courts today in prosecuting game violators.

"We haven't got court cooperation worth a darn," he said in an Inzak Walton league address. "A game law violator almost has to be a murderer as well before we can convict him here."

He criticized "inequitable justice" in some justice courts. Some courts impose practically no penalty and others remit fines, he charged.

"You do not need any research program to find out what is happening to the Oregon blacktail deer," the federal officer stated. "The reason they are decreasing is because of the flashlight and gun."

He asserted he heard 12 shots one night in the Florence area but nothing was done about it. Market hunters who use "slaughterhouse methods" have been found in the Sacramento valley," he added. "These market hunters kill more ducks in one week in the Sacramento valley than all the sportsmen in Oregon in the whole season."

ITALY TO FRONT IN BALKAN UNITY ANKARA, Jan. 13.—(AP)—Indications that Italy is taking the lead for a "united front" in southeastern Europe against possible aggression by Soviet Russia were hailed widely today as meaning double security for Turkey.

Italy's position was regarded by Turkish political leaders as "unambiguous opposition to soviet enterprise in the Danube basin or the Balkans."

Rome's efforts were viewed as being virtually in complete harmony with British and French aims—for a Balkan bloc that would be a barrier to both Russian and German expansion.

Turkey is allied with Britain and France in a mutual assistance pact.

"Foreign countries are promised all manner of special advantages in the markets of the United States in return for agreeing to suggestions from the United States as to how these foreign countries should conduct their own affairs."

GUILTY VERDICTS LEAD IN OREGON CRIMINAL CASES

Washington, Jan. 13.—(AP)—The commerce department said today 88.3 per cent of the defendants in major criminal cases in circuit courts of Oregon in 1938 were convicted.

Pleas of guilty accounted for disposition of most cases, it continued, with only 9.3 per cent being disposed of by trial. Of 962 persons convicted 891 pleaded guilty, courts held 67 guilty and juries convicted 67. The number was slightly larger than in the two preceding years.

In seven murder cases two defendants pleaded guilty and five were convicted by juries. In 11 manslaughter cases six pleaded guilty and five were convicted.

In 155 burglary cases 143 pleaded guilty, two were found guilty by juries. Of 79 automobile theft defendants 78 pleaded guilty and one was convicted by a jury. About 296 persons were charged with larceny but 17 cases were disposed of without trial, 268 pleaded guilty, one was found guilty by the court and 10 convicted by juries.

In the major cases one defendant was sentenced to death, 430 to the reformatory or prison, 355 were put on probation or given suspended sentences, 157 were sentenced to local jails, 14 fined only and five persons sent to juvenile institutions.
