DIES WARNS OF 'FIFTH COLUMN'

Washington, May 17.—(AP)—Rep. Dies (D., Tex.) told the house today that the nation would be wasting money if it neglected the threat of "Trojan horse" and "fifth column" tactics in the United States. Reading what he said were examples of "boring from within" presented to the committee on un-American activities, Dies, its chairman, requested government aid in ferreting out those elements and asserted amid applause from both Democrats and Republicans: "You are wasting your money on national defense if you do not courageously meet this situation."
