YABSLEY BEES IN LIMELIGHT AGAIN

Last night somebody gassed the bee stands of John Yabsley on Stevens street, killing a number of busy workers and the neighborhood received official cognizance again.

About a month ago the bees were a source of complaint, neighbors reporting they were stinging children, pets and pedestrians. Yabsley then agreed to move the stands farther from the street. At that time the deputy district attorney was among those stung.

CANADIAN FASCIST QUARTERS RAIDED

Montreal, May 24.—(P)—In swift overnight raids believed to be a prelude to a national drive against "fifth columnists" police seized six truckloads of swastikas, photographic equipment, cards, maps in Montreal homes and offices of suspected members of the National Unity Party, Canadian fascist organization.

The raids, executed under defense of Canada regulations, followed closely the seizure in London of Sir Oswald Mosley and others suspected of pro-fascist sympathies.

There were no arrests here, but H. R. Gagnon, superintendent of the royal Canadian mounted police, said some prosecutions would undoubtedly be made after an investigation.

ITALIAN LINER DELAYS SAILING FOR NEW YORK

Rome, May 24.—(P)—Sailing of the Italian liner Rex for New York has been postponed from May 29 to June 12, Italian line headquarters in Genoa said today.
