

SPY SUSPECT HAD SCORES OF MAPS OF ATLANTA AREA

Key Highways, Gas Lines, Railways, Mapped for Practice, He Tells Officers

Atlanta, May 24.—(AP)—Arrest of a spy suspect possessing maps of potential military value was disclosed today by Atlanta Police.

Detective Chief J. A. McKibben declined to give the prisoner's name but said he was being held "for investigation" and described him as a 65-year-old man who speaks with a heavy German accent.

McKibben said also that the suspect described himself as a bricklayer but his hands showed no signs of such manual labor; found in his quarters at a rooming house were scores of maps of key highways and natural gas lines leading into Atlanta, railway lines and yards in and around this city, floor plans of big Atlanta buildings; the prisoner admitted making the maps but said it was "for practice"; also in his room were numerous engineering text books, radio manuals and other technical works; he claimed to have been in the United States for 39 years, despite his accent, but could produce no social security number or naturalization papers. He was arrested on an anonymous telephone tip.

- 12 slices fresh white bread** (crusts discarded)
 1/2 cup sardines
 1/4 cup minced sweet pickles
 1 tablespoon minced pimientos
 1 tablespoon lemon juice
 3 tablespoons mayonnaise
 1/2 teaspoon paprika
 1/4 teaspoon celery salt
- Arrange bread slices on flat surface. Spread with soft butter and then with blended ingredients. Roll up each slice and wrap in waxed paper. Roll in a damp cloth and chill until serving time.

 12 slices Graham bread, buttered
 1/2 cup cottage cheese
 1 teaspoon minced chives
 1 teaspoon minced parsley
 1/4 teaspoon finely chopped olives
 1 tablespoon salad dressing
 1/4 teaspoon salt
 1/2 teaspoon paprika
- Toast bread on one side, butter it and then spread with other ingredients. Arrange sandwich fashion. Cut into two-inch squares and brown the uncooked sides. Serve fresh.

 1/3 cup chopped bacon
 1/4 cup chopped onions
 1/4 cup chopped green peppers
 1 cup tomato juice
 2/3 cup grated cheese
 2 egg yolks (or 1 egg)
 1/4 teaspoon paprika
 2 tablespoons butter
- 12 slices hot toast
- Cook bacon in a frying pan, add onions and peppers and simmer four minutes. Pour in juice and cheese. Cook slowly and stir constantly until thick and creamy. Add yolks, paprika and butter. Cook one minute. Stir constantly. Quickly spread on the hot toast.

FREE SUMMER SCHOOL FOR YOUNGER PUPILS PLANNED IN ASHLAND

Southern Oregon College of Education, Ashland, May 24.—(Sp)—Dr. Walter Redford, president of the Southern Oregon College of Education, announced today that the Lincoln school in Ashland would again offer free summer instruction to boys and girls of southern Oregon. Children in primary, intermediate and junior high school grades may enroll from June 10 to July 19, inclusive. School will last one-half day, beginning at 9 a. m. and closing at noon.

A selected group of children between 4 and 5 years will be permitted to attend the kindergarten conducted by Miss Lillian Nicholson, assistant professor of education at the college. Parents who have children who will enter school this fall are urged to enroll their children in the first grade during the summer session, as an introduction to school work. Children who will be able to enter school in the fall must have reached 6 years of age by November 15, 1940.

LOUISVILLE PLANS PRO-ALLIES RALLY

Louisville, Ky., May 24.—(AP)—A half-page ad in the Louisville Times today, signed by 21 civic leaders including Mark Ethridge, general manager of the Louisville Times and Courier-Journal, announced a "pro-allies rally" for Saturday night. The notice read in part: "The crisis in Europe calls for immediate action upon our part. We believe that congress should repeal all neutrality legislation that stands in the way of giving the allies all the help in our power, short of involving us in war or in declaring war. We believe that congress should consider what is the quickest and surest way of helping the allies and should give them such help (other than sending men to Europe and declaring war.)"

Omaha, Neb., May 24.—(U.P.)—Two Creighton university football players who they'd never seen a certain 160-pound Irish paper hanger named Clyde O'Brien.

The big he-men of the gridiron, in a badly battered condition from the effects of O'Brien's fists, are being held on charges of drunk driving and resisting arrest.

School authorities said they will investigate police charges against Johnny Knolls, a Chicago halfback and winner of the school's award for outstanding athletic prowess; and John "The Brain" Powers, star tackle.

After an automobile accident last night, police said the two athletes annoyed O'Brien and an older companion. O'Brien said the two men became offensive toward his companion, so he cleaned them up. Upon Mr. Powers he bestowed a fracture of both jaws, brain concussion and two fractured ribs. Knolls received a pair of black eyes and multiple cuts and bruises. O'Brien received no injuries.
