

### 150 MEET DEATH IN MEMORIAL DAY MISHAPS, SUICIDES

#### Highway Accidents Account for 80—Total Expected to Mount Over Holidays

The nation's toll of violent deaths reached the 150 mark as motorists crowded the highways on the second day of the Memorial day week-end.

Eighty persons were killed in highway accidents, 22 were reported drowned, 16 took their own lives, and 32 died from other violence.

New York and Pennsylvania led the states in total deaths with 26. Of Pennsylvania's total, 16 died in automobile accidents. California reported 13 deaths, Indiana 13, Ohio 10, and Wisconsin nine.

Bert Gardner, a Missouri farmer, was killed in one of the week-end's most unusual mishaps. He tied the lines from his team of mules around his waist as he plowed and was killed when the mules ran away.

#### No Speedway Deaths

At the Indianapolis speedway where death was challenged by defiant drivers in the annual 500-mile race, none was claimed. But seven died in highway accidents while en route to the race. A plane crash in Michigan claimed the life of one man, and another was killed in the New York subway. In California, a 74-year-old man was killed by an automobile while bicycling to a cemetery with a wreath for his daughter's grave.

The total was expected to mount to approximately 500 at the end of the four-day holiday, the same number killed in 1938.

1 cup bran  
1 1/2 cups flour  
1/3 teaspoon salt  
1 teaspoon soda  
1 teaspoon baking powder  
1/3 cup granulated sugar  
1 egg  
1 cup buttermilk (or sour milk)  
3 tablespoons fat, melted  
1 cup drained berries  
Mix ingredients, excepting berries. Mix lightly, fold in the berries and half-fill greased muffin pans. Bake 20 minutes in a moderate oven.

**Minute Steak**  
1 pound tender top round of beef  
2 tablespoons fat (suet preferred)  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
1/4 teaspoon pepper  
1 tablespoon butter  
Select beef cut about 1/8 inch thick. Pound well on both sides. Heat frying pan, add fat and when smoking add steak and sear it quickly on both sides. Lower the heat slightly and cook about four minutes. Spread with other ingredients and serve at once.

**Hot Chocolate Fudge Sauce**  
2 squares chocolate  
1-1/3 cups granulated sugar  
3 tablespoons light corn syrup  
1 teaspoon vanilla  
1/4 teaspoon salt  
Mix chocolate, sugar, milk and syrup. Cook slowly and stir constantly until a thick creamy mixture forms. Add the vanilla and salt and serve warm.

Watertown, Mass., May 31.—(U.P.)—The body of a young girl, stabbed and burned, was found today in a blazing automobile near the arsenal in Watertown, Mass.

She was identified as Catherine Nauer, 17. The killing was said by police to have been confessed by 23-year-old Frank Gomez.

Gomez was picked up on the highway early today by a motorist, and is reported to have told the driver that he wanted to go to a police station, as he had killed his sweetheart.

### FIFTH COLUMNISTS HELD IN ENGLAND REVEAL PLOTTING

#### Parachute Invasion Slated About June 9 Is Alleged Revelation to Officials

London, May 31.—(U.P.)—Several of the fifth column suspects rounded up by the British are supposed to have revealed that Germany planned a parachute invasion of the British Isles about June 9th.

At a hearing in Portsmouth, England, two men and a woman arraigned under the defense act,

are said to have told officials that Sir Oswald Moseley, British fascist, is in league with Hitler. The statements are attributed to Mrs. Marie Louisa Augusta Ingram who has been identified as the sister-in-law of a staff officer on the German high command.

The men supposed to have cooperated with her are William Swift, a naval employe, and Archibald Watts, an unemployed worker.

Witnesses testified that Mrs. Ingram told them that Moseley received instructions from Berlin.

The British fascist leader and other members of his organization are under arrest.
