BUILDING PERMITS DECREASE IN MAY
Nineteen permits valued at \$13,430 were applied for at the city building inspector's office in May, three of them being for the construction of new residences costing \$8,000 and 16 for remodeling and repairs totaling \$5,430, according to figures released today.

Last month's total was below the \$19,665 in the same period last year and a decrease from the \$18,945 figure in April of 1940.

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INJURED SOLDIER TO HOSPITAL IN BIG ARMY PLANE

Corp. Arthur Maclary of the U. S. air corps, who was seriously injured in an auto accident at Voorhies crossing Friday night, was flown to Letterman hospital at San Francisco yesterday morning by Lieut. W. E. Arnold. Corp. Maclary had spent Friday and Saturday nights in Sacred Heart hospital here.

The bomber, with the pilot and crew of five, arrived in Medford Saturday night from March field in southern California. Corp. Maclary, who suffered a fractured pelvis and broken right thigh and left forearm, was transferred from the local hospital to the airplane, where his stretcher was strapped securely to the ship. The plane took off at 8 a. m. for San Francisco.

The air corps officer was injured when he was crushed between two U. S. army trucks, parked on the Pacific highway, just south of Medford. One truck had stalled because of motor trouble and Corp. Maclary was attempting to attach a towed rope from one vehicle to the stalled truck.

A car driven by Clifford M. White, 18, of Ashland, traveling north, struck the rear truck, ramming it into the back end of the other vehicle and crushing the soldier between the two.

Corp. Maclary was traveling with a convoy of eight army trucks being transferred from March field to McChord field near Tacoma, Wash. He was seriously but not critically injured his attending physician stated.
