

RED CROSS FINDS MANY EAGER FOR DUTY IN WAR ZONE

Nurses, Ambulance Drivers Apply By Score — None Are Being Sent Overseas

San Francisco, June 3.—Eager volunteers for nursing and ambulance driving service overseas are being turned down by the score every day at the American Red Cross headquarters here.

A. L. Schafer, Pacific area manager for the Red Cross, said many are surprised when they learn that no Red Cross nurses or ambulance drivers are being sent overseas from the United States.

In the last war, Schafer explained, entire medical units were sent from this country; but European Red Cross societies are better organized now, and provide their own nurses and drivers. America is sending only food and clothing, money, equipment and supplies.

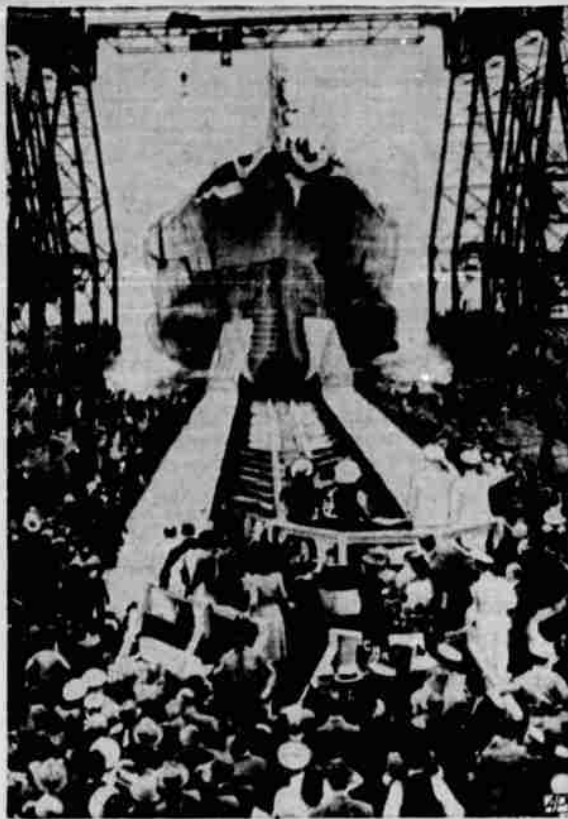
Supplies Sent
Loaded onto the Red Cross ship McKeesport at Jersey City, for example, went 150 ambulances, several hospital trucks and supplies for refugees—clothing, drugs, gauze, soap, cooking utensils and a wide variety of foodstuffs. An agreement recently was made with the department of agriculture to purchase surplus foodstuffs at half price. An initial consignment included 5,881,000 pounds of wheat flour, 1,240,000 pounds of corn meal, 750,000 pounds of lard, 800,000 pounds of prunes and an equal amount of raisins.
