40,000 PRISONERS, MUCH WAR BOOTY TAKEN, IS CLAIM

ago "I feared it would be my hard lot to announce the greatest military disaster in our long history."
Churchill warned Britain that "we must expect another blow to be struck almost immediately at us or at the French," and he declared vigorously:
"Britain will carry this war to victory if necessary for years—if necessary alone."
Some observers wondered if the "alone" comment may have been linked with a London report several days ago that Hitler was preparing to offer separate peace to Britain and France in an attempt to split the allies.
Both nations have vowed they would not accept individual peace.
The German high command also claimed 400 allied planes were destroyed in hangars and on the ground in addition to 79 shot down yesterday.
"Nine of our own machines are missing," the communique said.
Paris said 17 German planes were shot down in yesterday's aerial attack on the French capital.
It Duce Backed
Mussolini's cabinet stamped the seal of official approval on Italy's still undisclosed war plans as France signaled "no retaliation" on German civilian populations in the wake of the mass air attack by 300 Nazi warplanes on Paris.
Authorized French circles said the government would regard the hour-long raid, which took a toll of 254 dead and 652 wounded, as aimed at "military objectives"—not a raid on an open city.
France could "justifiably attack" factories around Berlin, it was said, but not civilians themselves.
Time bombs dropped by the high-flying Nazis were still exploding in Paris today.
Berlin was quiet overnight, although it had been expected that the allies might pay a "return call" on the German capital.
