

LEGION ADVISES PUBLIC CALM IN WAR EXCITEMENT

Investigation of Alleged Subversion Should Be Left to Authorities, Warning

"Don't Be Alarmed! Do not take the law into your own hands! Don't talk—listen!"

This advice to American Legionnaires was contained in a circular letter received today by H. J. Meiring, commander of the Medford post, from William D. Browne, state chairman of the Legion's radical activities committee. The letter pertained to the "fifth column" wave of fear and rumors that has engulfed the country.

"Alarmists in our midst would have us, on hearing of some reported group or individual acting subversively to the best interest of our people, take the law into our own hands," stated Mr. Browne's letter, which was attested to by State Commander Niel R. Allen of Grants Pass. "This we must not do, for we, as Legionnaires, are pledged to maintain law and order. Such direct action would be just the thing the 'fifth column' boys would have us take, for it would bring about a condition leading to civil strife if not to a dangerous riot and bloodshed."

Pointing out that the American Legion is not a law enforcement body, Mr. Browne continued: "We should at all times be on the alert for signs that show the workings of subversive groups. We should have an ear to the ground but our work must go no further than reporting our information to our department headquarters."

Such information, the letter indicated, would be investigated and if a law violation was indicated the matter would be turned over to the proper law enforcement agency.

FIVE VESSELS ADDED TO COASTAL SERVICE

Portland, Ore., June 6.—(AP)—The McCormick steamship line has obtained five Olson line steamers and the freighter Dorothy Phillips for its coastal service, District Agent K. C. Conyers said today.

They will replace five vessels recently sold to the French line and will enable the company to maintain a weekly service from California ports to the Columbia river and Puget Sound.

position is not registering with Mr. Roosevelt to any noticeable degree. What remains unsolved, is how much authority, if any, the president will confer on his war board. New dealers close to the White House are insisting that no authority be delegated; that the president maintain control or that the board report to a cabinet member or one of the president's anonymous secretaries.

REGARDLESS of the miffed feelings of the new dealers, the president is aware that if the defense material is to be produced without unnecessary delay, industry must have a pretty free hand. Already the administration is arranging to assist and cooperate.

It will finance a program to educate one million young men as skilled mechanics, for lack of suitable mechanics is one of the handicaps with which plant production is confronted. It now appears that skilled mechanics are the first line of defense; they are needed in manufacture of everything from air planes and aircraft engines to tanks and bomb sights. Until the mechanics are available the defense program will bog down.

It has been like pulling teeth to obtain loans from RFC, but now the unlimited resources of that agency are available to expand or build new plants for concerns receiving government orders. RFC is ready to solve the question of where to obtain capital, no need to bother with SEC to receive permission to float a stock issue. Thus one new deal agency is pushed aside and RFC (created by the way by Herbert Hoover), becomes a considerable banker.

MERCHANT MARINE TO TAKE CCC BOYS ABLE TO NEGOTIATE TESTS

Expansion of the U. S. Maritime commission personnel will transfer at least 500 civilian conservation corps enrollees to the merchant marine by July 1, according to word received by district CCC headquarters here today, which announced that 13 men will be taken from this section.

Under the new program, 126 CCC enrollees will be allowed to participate in tests throughout the ninth corps area. If, for any reason, other districts in the area are unable to fill their quota, additional men may be received from the local district, it was stated.

Officers said that the preliminary tests were comparable to stiff army and navy entrance examinations as the enlisted men of the merchant marine were regarded as the future officers of the U. S. Coast Guard. At least two-fifths of the acceptable applicants must have radio training or experience in radio operation.

Requirements specify that the applicant must be a literate American citizen, have served one year in the CCC ranks, must volunteer for enlistment in the merchant marine and must agree to serve at least one year on a ship as an enlisted man if such employment is available.

Headquarters reported that several district men have previously accepted enlistment in the maritime service and are now aboard the "American Girl," which returned recently from a South Sea cruise.
