### BRITAIN RESTRICTS LUXURIES SUPPLY

London, June 6.—(AP)—The government today ordered restrictions on retailers' supplies of a wide range of goods classified as luxuries, including hosiery, pottery, glassware and cutlery.

The retail sales of goods to be controlled amounted in 1939 to about 250,000,000 pounds (about \$800,000,000).

Another order prohibited the supply of certain type of machinery except under license, unless for government departments.

### \$4,000,000 SENT BY U. S. RED CROSS

Portland, June 6.—(AP)—War-stricken Europe has received \$4,000,000 from the American Red Cross in the past month.

A. L. Schafer of San Francisco said today. Germany, Japan and Russia have refused assistance, the Pacific coast director of the Red Cross told an interviewer. He added that the Polish Red Cross was still a "going concern, aiding 600,000 Polish refugees in the Balkan states.

### REPUBLICAN SENATORS WOULD REMAIN ON JOB

Washington, June 6.—(AP)—A conference of senate Republicans approved today a resolution stating that "congress should remain in session for the duration of the emergency."

A similar resolution has been approved by house Republicans, but the Democratic leadership is working for adjournment by June 22—two days before the Republican convention at Philadelphia.

### ROSARIA'S RULER RECEIVES CROWN

Portland, June 6.—(AP)—Reality merged with fantasy today as Portland celebrated its 32nd annual rose festival under the rule of Queen Virginia I.

The ruler of Rosaria, Virginia Rothenberg, was crowned last night in a colorful and impressive ceremony witnessed by 20,000 persons at Multnomah stadium.

The coronation signaled the opening of the four-day festival, the highlight of which will be the grand floral parade through downtown streets Friday.
