with rifles, bayonets from rock to rock, tree to tree. Scottish highlanders supporting their French comrades on the lower Somme battled in their shirt-sleeves in the stifling heat.

London military quarters reported the situation along the Somme-Aisne line "is not too bad—in fact it's pretty good." British and French officers were said to believe that German dive-bomber pilots were "losing their nerve"—not because they lack courage out because "there are certain forms of warfare which no human can stand very long."

Yankees Urged To Leave In London, the American embassy urged all Americans without urgent reasons for remaining in England to return home on the S. S. Washington, which sails about June 15. The embassy warned that it might be their last opportunity until after the war.

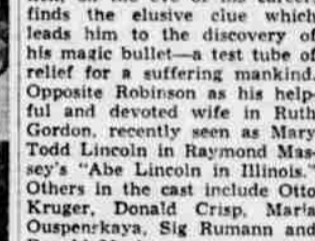
If the French claims are true, about one-fifth of the Germans reported 2,000 tanks engaged in the massive conflict have been knocked out of action in the first 72 hours.
