

SHAKESPEAREAN RULES ASSIGNED FOR REHEARSALS

With final try-outs completed, actors for the various plays in the sixth annual Shakespearean productions in Ashland this August were being chosen today in preparation for the launching of rehearsal schedules.

Director William David Cottrell said that he had chosen his cast for one play, was drawing players for a second and would hold final try-outs tonight, for the other two. Completed, are the "Merry Wives of Windsor" and "Much Ado About Nothing." The others, "As You Like It" and "The Comedy of Errors" were given last season and will have the 1939 players as far as possible.

Veterans of previous productions who have returned this season include Jimmie Baughman, George Smith, La Merle Beck Witt, John Reissacker, Gene Perry, Francis Schilling, Joe Beach, Doris Danford, Le Roy Lindner, Barbara Jean Schuler, Dick Schuchard and Pat Farrell. Dorothy Pruitt, one of this city's better known actresses who has participated in the plays since the festival was started in 1934, has not reported as yet but is expected to be included on the roster. Bob Stedman, technical director for the past three years, is attending summer school sessions at present but will join the troupe in July.

From out of town have come Harriet Uecker, of Hollywood; Doug Hubbard, of Spokane, Wash., and Carol Clark, of Salem. All three are newcomers but are regarded as experienced in dramatics and will play important roles in the festival. Efforts to renovate the civic Elizabethan theatre in Ashland have been accorded favor by

the Ashland city council, it was learned this week.
