

PLANE MECHANICS COURSE OFFERED IN N. Y. A. SCHOOL

Auto Mechanics, Commercial Design Also Taught Through Government Help

Earl I. Rice, NYA district supervisor, announces that from June 10 to August 10 courses in aviation mechanics, auto mechanics, and commercial design at the Eugene vocational school are open to young men of Jackson county, 18 to 25 years of age, eligible to NYA placement.

Several assignments are now available to NYA Camp Skinner Butte, Eugene. Those assigned to this residential school attend Eugene vocational school four hours each day. In this way the youth can earn money while training.

Qualifications necessary for registration in the aviation mechanics course are: high school graduation; at least one year of mechanical drawing; experience and ability along mechanical lines.

Qualifications for auto mechanics course are: no education requirement; a real interest and, if possible, experience in auto mechanics or related work. Qualifications for commercial design are: an interest and ability in this field.

Fee for the aviation mechanics course is \$5 per month and for the other courses \$2 per month. Youths selected must be willing to remain for the full summer session. Some of these youths may be admitted to the fall session beginning about September 9.

Recently the Kellys went on a flower hunt, a general outdoor sport in spring and summer. Mrs. Kelly wrote. On the same jaunt, past Fort Davis toward Cape Nome, they explored the ruins of igloos built into the sides of a hill.

And the food: "We've been eating a lot of reindeer lately, knowing we'll probably never get it again once we leave Alaska," Mrs. Kelly said in her letter. "I have a roast today, which I shall cook with onions and potatoes around it and a button of garlic wound in here and there. Last Sunday we had reindeer liver and the Sunday before reindeer T-Bone steaks."

"The beef we get is not only very expensive, but it has been frozen so long it is tasteless; we prefer the reindeer meat. Most of the stores are running pretty low and everyone is impatient for the first boat to come in with fresh supplies."

J., who was captured May 15 near Laon, on the Somme front. Whereabouts of the seven others, among them Gregory H. Wait, 39, Shelburne, Vt., whose wife lives in Portland, Ore., are unknown here.

NAZIS CLAIM DIES PROVOKING UNREST

Mexico City, June 7.—(P)—The German legation in an official statement charged today that reports of Nazi-directed "fifth column" activity in Mexico could be traced in part to the Dies committee on un-American activities. The statements said: "The principal instigators of the propaganda which consists of provoking a state of unrest in the North American people are some persons well known in Mexico who in union with the inter-allied committee of propaganda have conspired with the North American Dies."
