

TWO MORE PILOTS FROM SOGE CLASS GET CERTIFICATES

Kenton Robbins and Kent Ashcraft Pass Exam—New Group to Start Soon

Private pilot certificates were today in the hands of two more students enrolled at the Southern Oregon College of Education, Ashland, in the government's civilian pilot training program. Only three of the original class of ten students remain to receive their private pilot certificates. The course will be ended next Wednesday.

Kenton E. Robbins and Kent N. Ashcraft, both of Ashland, were the latest students to receive their private flying ratings. They passed examinations conducted at Medford municipal airport yesterday by Charles L. Walker and Rupert Herr, inspectors of the civil aeronautics authority. Five members of the class had previously procured their certificates as private pilots.

With the first class about completed, attention now is being concentrated on the next group to be trained under the government's expanded defense program. Officials connected with the project said that possibly as many as 30 pilot students would be allotted Southern Oregon College of Education if as many qualified youths as that could be procured. It was understood girls also would be allowed to qualify for the course.

Carl Nelson of Seattle, Wash., private flying specialist of the CAA, and Carlton Spencer, director of the civilian pilot training program at the University of Oregon, conferred here and in Ashland yesterday regarding the local program. Students who have registered already for the course are now undergoing the required physical examinations. Those interested in taking the course may obtain complete information at the Southern Oregon College of Education.

COMPANY A SIGNS 6; NEED 18 MORE

Enrollment of six men in company A, 180th infantry of the Oregon National guard was announced today by Capt. Carl Y. Tengwald, commanding. Eighteen recruits are still needed to bring the company up to authorized strength, the captain stated.

The new men enrolled were Don D. Heyde and Don Sellers, Medford, John Woodrich and Quentin Lewis, Eagle Point, Paul Scofield, Talent, and Frank Roberts, who previously had served in headquarters company which now is a detachment. Capt. Tengwald also announced that Sgt. George I. Hall had re-enlisted.

of eventually stemming the Nazi tide. A French spokesman admitted, however, that the situation everywhere along the north front is "serious."

The German high command was reported preparing to broadcast a "surrender or be destroyed" ultimatum against the beautiful French capital.

In Berlin, a Nazi spokesman said German troops were only as far from the heart of Paris as Zehlendorf is from the center of Berlin. Zehlendorf is a Berlin suburb, about eight miles out. The French, however, said the nearest German soldiers were now 25 miles from the French capital.

Three-Sided Attack
Nazi armies were attacking the "last ditch" defenders of Paris from three sides. The German demand for capitulation, Berlin reported, would follow the procedure in the case of Warsaw, capital of Poland, and Rotterdam, capital of Holland.

Warsaw, refusing to surrender, was bombed and shelled to ruins. Rotterdam capitulated in time to save much of the city.

Berlin asserted the fate of Paris would probably be decided "within the next hours."

The Nazi high command said operations along the entire front were "progressing rapidly" and that columns of the main German army of 2,000,000 men had captured Chalons-sur-Marne, about 25 miles south of the great French cathedral of Reims.

The Germans asserted Reims had already fallen. The French denied it.

Conflict Spreads
With flames of the main conflict spreading, Turkey reaffirmed her pledges of mutual military assistance to the Allies and dismissed Premier Mussolini's offer to respect her neutrality as "worthless."

Egypt, too, verged on joining the battle. The ancient kingdom of the Nile placed all its communication systems, air and naval bases and ports at the disposal of Great Britain, and promised the "greatest possible assistance" in the war against Italy.

While Britain rushed thousands of fresh troops, tanks and guns to bolster the hard-driven French defenders of Paris, Premier Reynaud of France dramatically announced that the French, if necessary, would withdraw to their African possessions—even their American possessions—to carry on the war against Germany. He appealed to President Roosevelt for all aid short of an expeditionary force.

His statement apparently doomed German hopes that France might surrender if Paris were captured, as she did in 1870.

In its daily communique, the German high command reported the capture of more than 100,000 allied prisoners in the 9-day-old battle of France and said 200 enemy tanks had been captured or destroyed in recent fighting.

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To Fight On
Premier Reynaud's declaration of France's grim resolve to fight on—even if driven out of France itself—included an appeal to President Roosevelt for a public statement that the United States would give all aid to the allies save an expeditionary force, and to send help "before it is too late."

An estimated 1,000,000 Italian fascist troops were reported poised along the maritime Alps frontier, ready to drive into France.

Italy, in her first detailed communique on operations, reported air raids "of particular importance" on the French naval base at Toulon and the French Tunisian base of Bizerta, and claimed the sinking of a cruiser and an oil tanker in the Mediterranean.

Great Britain, moving the vanguard of 120,000 school children out of bomb-conscious London, announced surrender of part of a division to German forces on the French coast, where the Nazi high command yesterday claimed capture of 20,000 allied troops and six generals.
