

20-30 DISTRICT CONVENTION TO OPEN SATURDAY

Medford Club Will Play Host to Ten Oregon Chapters, One From Washington

Approximately 75 out-of-town delegates from one Washington and 10 Oregon chapters are expected to attend the annual northwest district convention of the Association of 20-30 clubs here Saturday and Sunday. It was estimated by local club officials today.

Also attending the convention will be Abbe Strunk of San Antonio, Tex., president of the national association of 20-30 clubs. Mr. Strunk is touring the western states and plans to bring his lengthy trip to a close at the convention here.

Chicago, June 13.—(AP)—Heavy selling today caused a slump of 2 1/2 to 4 1/2 cents in wheat and corn price, reducing quotations of practically all grain contracts traded here to minimum "peg" now in force on the exchange. The market's action, which pit brokers blamed largely on European war news, came in the last session of trading before removal of the minimum which were established May 26 to check to collapse of grain

values that occurred when the German invasion of western Europe was in its first stage.
