Pitching Will Feature Series With Alco-Oaks

What may well develop into a pair of the classic mound duels ever witnessed in this section will take place Saturday night and Sunday afternoon at the fairgrounds baseball park as Albany's Alco-Oaks square off with the Medford Craters in a State league series that has all the earmarks of being no less than gigantic.

The Craters boast a remarkable semi-pro flouting staff; that has been proved time and again this season. But so has Albany a great trio of horsehide tossers. In short, it will be simply a case of two way-above-average rubber corps colliding head-on, with the hitters apparently taking a back seat.

Oscar (Red) Miller, veteran southpaw, leads the Albany hurlers with five victories in five trips to the post. The former Pacific Coast and Western International league portlander has beaten every club in the loop but Eugene and Medford, and he hasn't faced either of those teams yet.

Dick Johnson has won three and lost one game, his lone defeat coming at the hands of Silverton by a score of 2 to 1, despite the fact that he gave up only three blows. While Johnson has a fine record, he probably won't see action against the Craters now that Glenn Elliott, the bespectacled lefthanded sensation from Oregon State college has joined the Alco-Oaks.

Elliott, after pitching the Beavers to the championship of the northern division, Pacific Coast conference, this spring, worked his first tilt for Albany last Sunday. The result was a 12 to 1 win for the Oaks, with Jack and Jill Tavernmen from Portland getting just seven scattered bashits.

This Elliott kid, incidentally, is rated by baseball scouts far and away the greatest pitching prospect in northwest collegiate circles. Don McShane, Cleveland ivory hunter, told this writer not long ago that Elliott "has everything, including an incredible curve and marvelous control." A sophomore at Oregon State this year, Elliott seems destined to scale baseball's heights when his college career is completed.

In coping his five consecutive contests, Miller has allowed a total of 35 hits, an average of seven per game. He beat Bend, 5 to 2, with four blows; he defeated Hills Creek, 7 to 4, with 13 safeties; he stopped Silverton, 13 to 6, with 10 hits; he let the Portland Babes down with five clouts and trounced them, 6 to 2; and last weekend he pitched a three-hitter to trim Jack and Jill, 9 to 2.

It is not definitely known whether Miller or Elliott will take the first crack at the Craters Saturday night, but it will probably be Miller. Oscar has started all Albany's Saturday eve tilts and Manager Mac Reynolds is expected to follow the same pattern here. One

thing is certain, though, and that is that the Craters will see plenty of southpaw pitching over the week-end, for Elliott is slated to work the game Miller doesn't.

As for Medford, Manager Paul Hoffard will send Jimmy Rego, his own prize southpaw, to the rubber in the Saturday night fracas, and follow with big Bill Lanning or Steve Crippen Sunday afternoon. And speaking of pitching records, all these Crater hurlers are undefeated, too. Rego has won three, Crippen has copped three and Lanning has notched a pair.

The eyes of the entire circuit will be on Medford when the two clubs clash, for they proved in the first-half that they are the class of the loop. They tied for the title, each with nine wins and one loss, and the winner of this series will immediately become the favorite to take the second-half bunting.

Medford and Albany were scheduled to play the first series of the season on April 27 and 28, but the games were rained out. Until those tilts are played, and no dates have been set, the first-half pennant will be nobody's.

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## CARDS RECEIVE 4 PLAYERS AND CASH FOR PAIR

Inclusion of Davis Comes As Surprise—Jersey Joe and Curt Both in Slump

Jersey City, N. J., June 13.—(AP)—The Jersey Journal said today it learned from "unimpeachable sources" that the Brooklyn Dodgers paid \$200,000 to the St. Louis Cardinals for Slugger Joe Medwick and Pitcher Curt Davis.

St. Louis, June 13.—(AP)—The Brooklyn Dodgers, who exchanged their daffy ways for first place, eyed the National league pennant more manifestly today with the acquisition of Slugger Joe Medwick and Pitcher Curt Davis of the Cardinals.

The eleventh hour deal, which brought four Dodger players to the red birds, was "the biggest money transaction ever in the National league," Brooklyn President Larry MacPhail said.

However, the exact sum is the club's secret. The known top check was the \$185,000 which the Chicago Cubs paid the Cardinals for Dizzy Dean in 1938.

MacPhail Happy MacPhail, who flew east last night after an all-day conference consummating the deal, chuckled over his new players, whose sale was surprising only in that it included Davis.

Medwick, an outfielder, made his reputation with a bat. He has averaged better than 300 ever since he joined the Cards in 1932. His top was .374 in 1937 when he won the league batting championship and was voted the most valuable player.

The next season Medwick drew a \$20,000 salary, but his batting average fell to .322. He hit .332 last year.

Medwick Boomed However, the bat baron's hits have decreased with the seventh place Cardinals' fortunes this season and his present average is .304. During the current slump he has been booed by home fans.

Simultaneously, Davis, who hails from Greenfield, Mo., has slipped. He hasn't won a game this year in seven starts and has four losses. He came to the Cardinals in the Dean deal and won 12 games and lost eight his first season here.

In 1939 Davis won 22 and dropped 16, carrying much of the mound burden as St. Louis finished a close second to Cincinnati.

Key To Cards Two of the new Cardinals—Pitcher Carl Doyle of Knoxville, Tenn., and Outfielder Ernie Koy of Sealy, Texas—will report tomorrow at Philadelphia.

Neither has been at the forefront among the Dodgers this season. Koy was batting .209 in 18 games at the end of last week.

Also transferred to red bird registry are Pitcher Sam (Nick) Nahem, who is now with the Louisville American Association team, and Outfielder Berthold Haas of Montreal in the International league. Both had been out on option.

## LEAGUE FORBIDS GRIDMEN TO SELL GRATIS TICKETS

Sun Valley, Idaho, June 13.—(AP)—When member schools of the Pacific coast conference give free tickets to their varsity football players they do not intend those tickets to be sold, faculty representatives of the big far western circuit emphasized today.

The faculty group, meeting in annual summer session here, turned down a member's proposal that the conference code be relaxed to give football players the option of receiving tickets or the equivalent in money.

But the faculty representatives went further. They indicated the code would be amended to prohibit sale of the free tickets.

Varsity squad members now receive four complimentary tickets for home football contests and two for other games.

Another proposal—to make ice hockey a four-year varsity sport embracing freshmen players—also got the thumbs down vote of the faculty men.

Meanwhile football coaches of the conference, meeting in separate session, banned use of white or silver uniforms for night games and reaffirmed their opposition to rocker or running shifts involving linemen.

But Gill, a candidate for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination added: "We must be prepared so if these madmen do come over here they will never get back to tell about the trip."
