

### SCARLET FEVER IMMUNITY GIVEN IN FORM OF PILL

Substitute for Vaccination Developed by Couple Who Discovered First Form

New York, June 13.—A pill which immunizes against scarlet fever was announced to the American Medical Association today.

These pills are a substitute for vaccination and are taken with a drink of water.

They were developed by Dr. George F. Dick and Gladys Henry Dick, who devised the scarlet fever vaccine.

The pills have been tried on 102 persons, the Dicks reported. They are taken daily for two or three weeks. Of these test cases, 94 percent were immunized and the rest had transient scarlatine rashes.

The pills are not now recommended as a general substitute for vaccination, the Dicks stated. They should be used on persons for whom scratches are risky, who are allergic to hives, who have had hearts or when speed is urgent during an epidemic.

It took eight years to get a mouth immunizing substance which human beings could take. At the start the Dicks developed a liquid which immunized but such enormous quantities had to be drunk that it was not practicable.

Next came a white powder, which also immunized. But this made people seasick. Finally the pills in tablet form were developed. A coating over the tablet prevents it from dissolving in the stomach, and so avoids nausea. Dissolution occurs in the intestines.

### THREE FINED ON SLOT MACHINES

Three men paid fines of \$15 and costs in justice of the peace court this afternoon after pleading guilty to state police charges of possession of slot machines.

They were L. Gilhouse, proprietor of the Rogue River Lodge; Lewis L. Peabody, owner of At-Last-a-Lunch at Trail, and Harvey Snider, owner of the slot machine in Peabody's establishment.

Gilhouse, according to information furnished the court, had two machines in his lodge, one for nickels and one for dimes. Peabody, the court was informed, operated his five-cent machine on a 50-50 basis with Snider.

The slot machines were being confiscated today and will be destroyed, the court stated.

Arrows on this map show how Berlin sources said German forces will attempt to slice France in half and join Italian forces massed to attack in the south. Germans claimed to have crossed the Marne river and to be thrusting southwest along the English Channel coast, trapping an allied force in a small "pocket" at Dieppe. Meanwhile the French government moved from Paris to Tours. Black area is approximate area of France now in German hands. Dotted line shows, by comparison, the greatest advance made by the Germans in 1914, when they were stopped at the Marne.
